Sermon followed by Service

I have here a bottle of Aspirin. You know what aspirin is good for - it relieves our pain and helps keep our hearts healthy. Here is something a bit more exciting - an epi-pen. Epi-pens shoot epinephrin, or adrenalin, into the body; they can give our bodies a kick-start, an energy boost, and sometimes keep us from dying. Here I have my wedding ring; there's gold in this-here ring. I say that word "gold," and what happens? Our ears perk up; our interest piques.

What do aspirin, epinephrin, and gold have to do with today? It was 125 years ago when German chemists working for Bayer add some sort of salt to some willow tree stuff and come up with Aspirin. One-hundred-twenty five hears ago when an American east-coast chemist takes the juice of the adrenal glands and purifies it down to epinephrin. And 125 years ago, when word got out in Seattle and San Francisco - "There's gold in the Klondike! - and the Klondike Gold Rush begins.

What else do we know about these three things? It wasn't long and the Klondike Gold Rush sputtered with more lives ruined than enriched. This aspirin might take away some pain; it might help keep my heart pumping; but just for a while. This epinephrin might give my heart and my breathing a jump start, but it can't keep me alive forever. All these things can be good, even great discoveries, but they all leave us wanting something more, something better.

One-hundred-twenty-five years ago, something more, something better, someone more, someone better was at work right here in Libertyville. The Shepherd and His Spirit were here working in the hearts of some German-Lutherans. He worked in them a discontent for the riches and pain-relievers of the world - they wanted something better, something more for their hearts and their children. He worked in them a discontent with

churches that thought it ok to compromise on God's Word, a discontent with churches that were satisfied with less of Jesus and more of self. He worked in them a hunger for God's Truth, a thirst for God's grace.

Hungering together for God's Truth, thirsting together for God's grace, the Shepherd and His Spirit connected them with a pastor from Waukegan. They rented space and gathered at the Union Church on Church Street (not the same building, but where the Episcopal church is now across from the library). First for a funeral, then once a month. But the Shepherd and His Spirit worked in them a discontent with once a month; they hungered and thirsted for more. So they met twice a month. But the Shepherd and His Spirit worked in them a discontent with twice a month; they hungered and thirsted for more of God's grace and truth. So they met every week.

This is before paved roads and fancy cars. The families walked to church; I imagine some came by horse-drawn wagon; some got to ride horse and buggy. This is before the railroad came to Libertyville. The Waukegan pastor would ride the freight train to Rondout where congregation members would pick him up and bring him in the last few miles by horse and buggy. A couple weeks ago on vacation, I was whining about riding an hour in airconditioned comfort to get to church - oh, how good we got it!

Then what? Those first few families, they told their friends and neighbors. And the Shepherd and His Spirit gathered more and more. They pitched in and worked together. After a few years, they bought some swampland and built a white, wooden church. (You can still see it over by St. Joe's. In 1950, we sold it to buy and build here.) Later, they built a parsonage next to the church. You see, they weren't content to settle and relax and rely on someone else to provide their pastor. The Shepherd and His Spirit had them hungering and thirsting for more, hungering and thirsting to do more. The library downtown has a news bit that describes the members of St. John as eager - why? Because of the way they got the

mortgages for church and parsonage paid off. The Shepherd and His Spirit had them hungering and thirsting for his grace and truth. The Shepherd and His Spirit had them eager and working together to share his grace and truth.

So the Spirit called and the Shepherd gathered. We grew out of the white, wooden church, and built this beautiful, Lannon-stone church for the Shepherd and his work. We had Sunday School classes squeezed and crammed into the coat closet (we call it the table storage room) down under the front steps, squeezed and crammed into the vault room under my office, even squeezed and crammed into the nuts and bolts and light bulb closet behind the stage. Squeezed and crammed, the Shepherd and his Spirit worked a discontent, not just for classrooms in closets, but a discontent for one-hour a week Sunday School. The Shepherd and his Spirit wanted more for our children. And so we wanted more for our children - not just more stuff, more ball-time, more game time. No, the Shepherd and his Spirit worked in our hearts a drive to give our children more time with Jesus. So we pitched together and worked together and paid together to build our school wing, and then nearly 10 years later to open our school sharing the grace and truth of Jesus.

Why? Why all this? Why are we here? ... for 125 years? Why? The Shepherd and His Spirit had his people singing and living Psalm 100! "Shout for joy to the LORD, all the earth. Worship the LORD with gladness; come before him with joyful songs. Know that the LORD is God. It is he who made us, and we are his; we are his people, the sheep of his pasture." So why? Why all this? Why are we here? Because he made us. He made us his. He made us his people, the sheep of his pasture. He called us, gathered us, put his name on us.

Why? Oh, we want to find some reason in ourselves, don't we? Some reason to pat ourselves on the back. Moses fought that kind of thinking: "The LORD did not set his affection on you and choose you

the LORD loved you." Paul fought that kind of "pat-ourselves-on-the-back" thinking: "Brothers, think of what you were when you were called. Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many were of noble birth." That's my history; that's our history! "It is because of him that [we] are in Christ Jesus." That's why Paul says: "Let him who boasts boast in the Lord." And that's why we're in Psalm 100 today: "Shout for joy to the LORD, all the earth. Worship the LORD with gladness; come before him with joyful songs. Know that the LORD is God. It is he who made us, and we are his; we are his people, the sheep of his pasture."

We're here because he's called us, gathered us, put his name on us. That's not to say that he's always had us singing out strong or always singing together in perfect harmony, has he? Just like the rest of the world, there have been times we've preferred Klondike gold over the treasures of heaven. Times we've been content with the pain relievers and the quick fixes of the world instead of hungering and thirsting for the comfort and life that Jesus has for us. In other words, there have been times, so many times, so many ways, we have acted more like the sheep of this world than like those sheep in the window, eager to be with their Shepherd.

What happens to people who prefer Klondike gold over the treasures of heaven? What happens to people who are content with the pain relief and the quick fixes of the world instead of hungering and thirsting for Jesus? What happens to the sheep of this world? They wander and follow themselves and chase themselves and cheer themselves away from God, against God, and into hell. We've all had days and ways we've gone against God, haven't we?

That's why Jesus didn't just call us, gather us, put his name on us. First, Jesus gave his life for us. His life in place of our lives. His death in place of our deaths. He took our place as the wandering sheep; he took our place as the sheep chasing and cheering the sin of the world; he took our place as sheep turned against God. He took our place and took the judgment God had against us. His life in place of our lives, his death in place of our deaths. He paid the price so that God can see you and call you forgiven. So God can call you and gather you as his. So - in baptism - God can put his name on you with a smile.

Now instead of having to settle for the pain relief of the world, we get to live a new life with the peace and the hope that Jesus have for us. Instead of settling for the quick fixes of the world, we get to live with the Spirit of God himself living in us to jump start our hearts, to power us with the life and the love of God. Now, instead of settling for gold, we get to live with the treasures of heaven as ours!

That's why Psalm 100 isn't just part of our past. Psalm 100 is the song of our hearts today: "Shout for joy to the LORD, all the earth. Worship the LORD with gladness; come before him with joyful songs. Know that the LORD is God. It is he who made us, and we are his; we are his people, the sheep of his pasture. Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise; give thanks to him and praise his name. For the LORD is good and his love endures forever; his faithfulness continues through all generations." Amen.
