

#### **FIRST LESSON**

1 Samuel 3:1-10, 17- 4:1

The boy Samuel ministered before the LORD under Eli. In those days the word of the LORD was rare; there were not many visions.

One night Eli, whose eyes were becoming so weak that he could barely see, was lying down in his usual place. The lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the LORD, where the ark of God was. Then the LORD called Samuel.

Samuel answered, "Here I am." And he ran to Eli and said, "Here I am; you

called me." But Eli said, "I did not call; go back and lie down." So he went and lay down.

Again the LORD called, "Samuel!" And Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, "Here I am; you called me."

"My son," Eli said, "I did not call; go back and lie down."

Now Samuel did not yet know the LORD: The word of the LORD had not yet been revealed to him.

The LORD called Samuel a third time, and Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, "Here I am; you called me."

Then Eli realized that the LORD was calling the boy. So Eli told Samuel, "Go and lie down, and if he calls you, say, 'Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening.'" So Samuel went and lay down in his place.

The LORD came and stood there, calling as at the other times, "Samuel! Samuel!" Then Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

"What was it he said to you?" Eli asked. "Do not hide it from me. May God deal with you, be it ever so severely, if you hide from me anything he told you." So Samuel told him everything, hiding nothing from him. Then Eli said, "He is the LORD; let him do what is good in his eyes."

The LORD was with Samuel as he grew up, and he let none of his words fall to the ground. And all Israel from Dan to Beersheba recognized that Samuel was attested as a prophet of the LORD. The LORD continued to appear at Shiloh, and there he revealed himself to Samuel through his word.

And Samuel's word came to all Israel. Now the Israelites went out to fight against the Philistines. The Israelites camped at Ebenezer, and the Philistines at Aphek.

#### **SERMON**

1 Samuel 3:1-10, 17-4:1

Someone calls your name, taps you on the shoulder. They have something to say to you, something for you to do. What do you say? What do you do? It depends, doesn't it? Who's the somebody? What do they want to say? What do they want you to do? Do you have time? Does what they want fit what you want? Someone calls your name, taps you on the shoulder. What do you do? It depends, doesn't it?

During COVID-time, we had fewer taps on the shoulder. Coming out of COVID-time, coming into a year of celebrating 125 years of God's grace, what words of wisdom do you have for a) those who are tapping the shoulders, and b) those whose shoulders are tapped?

What if God were to tap you on the shoulder, call your name? What if God had something to say to you, something for you to do? What would you do? Would it still depend?

Our lesson comes from a sad time. God wasn't calling; he wasn't tapping. We're told, "in those days the word of the LORD was rare; there were not many visions." In these first books of the Bible, we hear God talk with Adam and Eve, and even Cain after he killed his brother Abel. We hear God talk with Abraham and Jacob, and later talk with Moses. But now, some 300 years after Moses died, when God's people were in God's promised land, we hear: "the word of the LORD was rare." God wasn't speaking to his people.

Which is worse - to be called and tapped for too much? Or to be ignored, skipped over? Why?

Why not? The book of Judges tells us about those 300 years between Moses and Samuel -- "another generation grew up, who knew neither the LORD nor what he had done for Israel." – We might ask, "Where were the parents, where were the grandparents, if they had sponsors, where were the sponsors? Why didn't their children know?" Or we might ask, "What about the children? Did they think they knew better than their parents? Were they just too lazy, stuck on self?" There was probably enough blame to go both ways, right? But blame's not the point. Look what happened when the people didn't listen to God. "The Israelites did evil in the eyes of the LORD and served the Baals. They forsook the LORD, the God of their fathers, who had brought them out of Egypt. They [lived like the rest of the world.] They provoked the LORD to anger." And these are the last words of the book of Judges – "in those days; everyone did as he saw fit."

So why wasn't God speaking to his people? Because his people didn't bother to listen. God's judgment on sin doesn't always wait until death and hell. Part of God's judgment is that he hands sinners over to the sins of their hearts. For example, if people don't want to listen to him, he doesn't speak to them. And that isn't just an Old Testament judgment kind of thing. When the people of Jerusalem didn't like what Jesus had to say, he left.

We see the same thing in history. When God's people don't listen to him, he doesn't speak to them and he goes elsewhere. For example, Germany was the center of the Reformation; today there are just a handful of congregations that still listen to God's Word as God's Word. And where is Christianity growing the fastest? We might like to think of our country as "God's country," and Americans as "God's people," but the church is growing fastest in Africa. Churches in other countries send their missionaries here because here is where they see an emptiness of God's Word.

If you had \$23,000,000 (annually) for sending and supporting missionaries, where would you send missionaries?

If God's word is silenced here in the United States, it won't do us any good to point fingers at other people. We need to ask ourselves -- what is more true for us -- "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening?" or "everyone did as he saw fit"? If we look close inside we find we aren't always the best listeners. With busy days and busy families, with family and friends shouting for attention, it's terribly easy to give our attention to the world instead of to the Word.

When God's word sounds too tough, too demanding, when it doesn't make sense or tell us what we want to hear, it's so easy to stop listening and shrug our shoulders, "God doesn't tell me what I need to hear." When we don't like what God has to say, it's so easy to switch from, "Speak, for your servant is listening" to "Listen, God, I was thinking and I like my thinking a whole lot better than what you have to say." We have to watch out so it doesn't become true of us and our children and grandchildren -- "in those days everyone did as he saw fit" and "in those days the word of the LORD was rare."

In what areas of your life, or in what areas of the Bible, do you find it most challenging to say: "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening"?

Those words serve as a warning to us; but they also show us just how great God's love is in the rest of our lesson. Even though and even when most of God's

people weren't paying much attention to God; even though and even when most people had turned their backs on God -- even then God showed his love. He spoke up. He gave his Word. And he called Samuel to be his prophet.

Our lesson tells us how. Samuel was a young boy, maybe about 12 years old. He lived in the temple and served God and God's High Priest Eli. One night, very late at night or very early in the morning, the Lord called, "Samuel." Samuel hadn't heard God's voice before; so he figured Eli must have called him and he went to answer Eli. Three times that happened. We might think, three strikes and you're out. If I try to call somebody three times on the phone, and get no answer, I get frustrated. If I have to say something three times in confirmation class, that's not good. But God called three times and three times he got no answer. And yet the LORD was patient.

By this time Eli figured out who was calling, so he gave Samuel this great answer, "Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening." Now the fourth time God didn't just call Samuel, he appeared to Samuel. And Samuel answered, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

Did you notice God's love and patience there? Even when his people weren't listening, God spoke up. Even when Samuel didn't know where to turn, the Lord kept calling.

We see God's love and patience even more in the message and work God gave Samuel as his prophet. The Lord's message that late night was no good news. It was news of death and judgment. But in the years to come God used Samuel to point his people toward their Savior Jesus.

Today Jesus calls us and speaks to us. Not in a voice in the middle of the night, but in his Word, which he has written down for us. And what does Jesus say to us? It doesn't matter who you are; it doesn't matter how well you listened in the past, or how much you shut your ears in the past. Today (I don't know about tomorrow), today Jesus is giving you the opportunity to start with a clean slate, a fresh start. The times you argued, the times you ignored, the times you blew God off ... instead of writing you off, he's written them off. Instead of looking to make you pay, he paid. Today, you get to have a clean slate, a fresh

start. Even better, your slate isn't just clean; it's filled in with Jesus - life done, life done right, life done well. With Jesus, God sees you ready and right for life with him. And now Jesus calls you, taps you on the shoulder, and says: "I've got something to say to you."

What do you say? What do we say? "Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening." When Jesus calls you out, when Jesus in here [Bible], when Jesus in a Christian brother or sister speaks up and points out your sin ... what do we say? "Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening." When God's Word doesn't make sense to us, what do we say? When God's forgiveness seems improbable, when his promises – "God will make all things work out for your good" – when his promises seem impossible, what do we say? "Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening."

And what does he do? He opens our ears to hear and he opens our minds to understand. And even if he we don't understand, he opens our hearts to believe – to believe he's right even when we don't understand it, to believe his love, even when we can't see it; to believe his promise, just because he says so.

And when he nudges our hearts, calls our name, taps us on the shoulder .... Oh, how does he nudge our hearts, call our name, tap us on the shoulder? In here [Bible], by showing us a need in here or out there, through God's people here calling us to action. When he nudges our hearts, calls our name, taps us on the shoulder, what do we do? We don't settle for "it depends," do we? We find a way to say, "Yes, Lord."

How does God call us and tap us on the shoulders today?

Is it ever alright to answer God with an "it depends," to decline his call, to shrug off his tap on your shoulder? Explain your answer.

Why? Some days we might have to tell our old self: "Because he's God, and we're not; so stop acting like you're God and he's not." Other days we get to remind ourselves: "Look at Jesus and what he's done for me. Look out and about at all that he's doing for me. Look up to heaven and what he has for me." Then

when he calls, gathers, taps, and nudges, we won't pretend not to hear; we won't pretend we know better; we won't pretend that what we have to say and do is more important than what he has for us to say and do. NO, when he calls, gathers, nudges, taps, we'll answer like Samuel: "Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening." Amen.

When God gives you an "unwelcome" call or tap on the shoulder, what do you tell yourself? What do you tell him?
