Sermon

Good Friday - 2024

Imagine you're there as Jesus is crucified. Listen for the voices. What do you hear?

The Jewish leaders seem to be the most fired up. Not against the Romans for killing one of their own, but against Jesus. "He saved others, ... but he can't save himself! He's the king of Israel! Let him come down now from the cross, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God. Let God rescue him if he wants him, for he said: "I am the Son of God." The trials are over, the sentence they wanted is being executed, but they're still hating, sarcastically demanding Jesus provide evidence to prove his claims.

Then there are the soldiers: "If you're the king of the Jews, save yourself." And people just passing by: "You who are going to destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! Come down from the cross, if you are the Son of God?" Even the criminals on the crosses next to Jesus: "Aren't you the Messiah? Save yourself and us!"

So many different voices, but they all swell into one diabolical chorus: "If you're really who you say you are - prove it!"

Today we hear the echoes. "God, if you're really there, if you really care, prove it! God, look at all the evil around us, look at all the hurt in the world; if you really care about us, why don't you stop it! God, if you really want me to believe, answer my prayer (my way), give me a sign, fix me, fix this mess of a world I'm in." The voices come from all around us. Some speak in hatred, determined to fight against a God they can't stand or understand. Some mouth off just to have fun at our expense. Some voices sound skeptical doubting Christianity's claims. Some voices sound desperate, somehow hoping their complaint would convince God to prove himself. Just like that first Good Friday, people today continue to put God on trial demanding to see the evidence they want.

You hear those voices. How do they affect you? Do they make you angry? - "How dare you!" Or leave you frustrated? - "You just don't understand." Or, maybe, do those voices ever get you wondering if they're right? Or wishing that Jesus would step in and prove himself and prove you right?

What did Jesus do with those voices? He let his Father answer. He let his Father answer with darkness; he let his Father answer by shaking the earth. He let his Father answer and He listened to the voice of his Father. He listened to the voice of his Father at his baptism - "You are my Son whom I love, with you I am well-pleased." He listened to the voice of his Father from before all time - "You are my Son; today I have begotten you." And he listened to the voice of his Father saying things more hurtful than anything anyone in the crowd around him said. He listened as his Father called him guilty, and cursed him as guilty, and turned his back on him as guilty. Jesus listened to his Father, and it hurt: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?!" Jesus knew why. He had listened to the voice of his Father. God was cursing him, crushing him - as one of us, in place of us - for the way we question God, judge God, turn

on God. Why? So that taking our place as guilty and paying for our sin, he can call you and me forgiven, forgiven and right for life with God. Because Jesus had listened to the voice of his Father instead of just listening to the voices of the world, Jesus knew why. And because Jesus listened to the voice of his Father, Jesus knew what his Father had for him after "It is finished." Jesus knew he could look forward to Easter and forever.

So what did Jesus do with those voices he heard all around him? He added his own. Not another voice of anger - "I"ll show you!" Not another voice demanding - "If you think you're so smart, so right, prove it; prove your way is better than my way." No, Jesus added a voice of grace - as the soldiers are pounding the nails into his hands and feet - "Father, forgive them." A voice of concern for his mother making sure she's taken care of. A voice of grace and hope for the thief who repented - "Today you will be with me in paradise." A voice of confidence and trust - just before he died - "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit."

When the world around you is demanding proof, when your hurting heart is looking for proof, listen to the voice of your Father, listen to the voice of Jesus, and there the Spirit will give you all the proof you need. Amen.

Our Communion Practice

We practice close communion, the Biblical and ancient practice of the church, celebrating the Lord's Supper only with those who are united with us in faith and teaching. In this sacrament we give public confession of our doctrinal unity and fellowship; therefore, we invite visitors from sister WELS or ELS congregations to join us in the sacrament. We ask our fellow Christians from other denominations to kindly respect our practice and refrain from the Lord's Supper at this time. If you have questions, please speak with the pastor.

We Care about Your Children

We love to have children with us for worship. Children's worship bulletins and "church bags" (with paper, colors, and Bible story books) are available from an usher. Baby noises can be beautiful to our Savior who said, "Let the little children come to me." If children are crying loudly, our nursery and Gathering Area (back of the church) are audio-equipped and available for you and your young children. After the children regain their composure, come back so we can all worship together.


Large Print Service Folders are available from an usher.

Our Facilities

Restrooms are in our Fellowship Hall, downstairs and to the right of the kitchen.



Our service this evening is a Tenebrae service, a service of shadows and darkness, reminding us of the darkness of our sin and guilt, the darkness of the world's hate and anger against God, and, yes, the darkness of God's curse on our sin, charged against Jesus.

In a Tenebrae service, candles are extinguished and lights are dimmed to impress on us the utter darkness and loneliness, the horrible curse that Jesus faced on the cross. As you hear of Jesus' burial and the service closes, expect to hear the *strepitus*. (In various Tenebrae traditions, the sharp, loud noise of the *strepitus* stands for the earth shaking and rocks breaking at Jesus' death, the stone rolled in front of Jesus' tomb, or the rending of Christ's tomb on Easter morning.) As the seventh candle is removed we are reminded of Jesus' death; as it returns we are reminded that he lives with the Father. As the service draws to a close, see the sign of hope - in the darkness, a light still burns - Easter is coming!

After the service, the congregation may remain for prayer and meditation before leaving quietly. If you wish to speak to the pastor, he will be available in the parking lot, weather permitting.

BIDDING PRAYER

The *bidding prayer* is an ancient form of prayer in which a minister bids or invites the congregation to pray.

M: Let us pray for the whole Church, that our gracious Father would defend her from the devil and keep her faithful to her Lord.

Silent prayer

- M: Almighty and everlasting God, you have revealed your saving name to the world through Jesus Christ our Lord. Protect us from the assaults of the evil one, and help us remain faithful to your Word so that in every adversity we may stand firm in our faith and give ourselves fully to our Savior's work, through Christ our Lord.
- C: Amen.

M: Let us pray for those who serve in the public ministry and for all people of God.

Silent prayer

- M: Almighty and everlasting God, you rule over all things for the good of your people. Preserve us from divisive spirits and false teachers. Give your servants the grace to proclaim Christ joyfully in word and deed so that all who hear them may come to know their Savior better and be strengthened for their lives of service, through Christ our Lord.
- C: Amen.
- M: Let us pray for those who are being instructed in the Word, that they remain firm in the simple faith of Baptism.

Silent prayer

- M: Almighty and everlasting God, you make us your own dear children by the washing of rebirth and renewal in the Holy Spirit. Give strength to all who are buried with Christ in Baptism, that each day they may die to sin and rise again to live new and holy lives, through Christ our Lord.
- C: Amen.
- M: Let us pray for our earthly government, our rulers, and all who are in authority.

Silent prayer

- M: Almighty and everlasting God, you have established earthly government to keep a measure of order in this dying world and to protect us from the disorder of sin. Give to all rulers the wisdom to govern well and to all citizens the desire to obey them, so that we may live peaceful lives in all godliness and holiness, through Christ our Lord.
- C: Amen.
- M: Let us pray that our gracious Father would protect us and our communities from the many earthly calamities that threaten us.

Silent prayer

- M: Almighty and everlasting God, on all sides we are surrounded by danger from wars and famine, from disease and pestilence, with the devil begrudging us every minute of our lives. Protect us from all these miseries so that your name may still be glorified in them and so that we may safely pass through them to your heavenly kingdom, through Christ our Lord.
- C: Amen.
- M: Let us pray for those who are outside the Church, that they may come to know the one true God and Jesus Christ whom he has sent.

Silent prayer

- M: Almighty and everlasting God, your Son was lifted up on the cross so that he might draw all people to himself. Through the proclamation of your Word, mercifully gather from the nations a people that are your very own, that we may join together around your throne in glory to praise and thank you forever, through Christ our Lord.
- C: Amen.
- M: Let us pray for our enemies and for all those who hate us.

Silent prayer

- M: Almighty and everlasting God, no one can harm us without grieving you, whose name we bear. We ask that you would change the hearts of those who work against us and who hate us without reason. Give them repentance and faith so that they may be glad with us and find joy in your love, through Christ our Lord.
- C: Amen.
- M: Let us pray for all who suffer under cross and trial:

Silent prayer

- M: Almighty and everlasting God, you sent your Son into the world to bear our griefs and to carry our sorrows. Help those who are suffering for your name's sake and who are struggling against temptation, that they may not be overwhelmed with sadness but find relief in your grace, through Christ our Lord.
- C: Amen.

M: Finally, let us pray for all those things for which our Lord would have us ask in the words he himself has taught us.

THE LORD'S PRAYER


