Sermon followed by Service

December 10, 2023

Isaiah 40:3-5

³ A voice of one calling:
"In the desert prepare the way for the LORD; make straight in the wilderness a highway for our God.
⁴ Every valley shall be raised up, every mountain and hill made low; the rough ground shall become level, the rugged places a plain.
⁵ And the glory of the LORD will be revealed, and all mankind together will see it. For the mouth of the LORD has spoken."

Do you hear "the voice?" Do you hear the "wow" of Jesus' birth? Or do you just hear the noise? There's a lot of noise this season, isn't there? Some of it might start nice: bells ringing, and carols singing. Some of it might start fun: children shaking packages, the sounds of cooking in the kitchen, and then the "wow" when gifts are opened and food is served. But some of the noise, more and more of the noise, is arguing, fighting, grinching, and scrooging. So much noise, it can be hard to hear the voice and the wow of Jesus' birth.

In your noisy, noisy world, hear this: "a voice of one calling: "in the desert prepare the way for the LORD; make straight in the wilderness a highway for our God." In the days of Isaiah when a king wanted to travel, he wanted a good road. So out would go his messengers, "Prepare the way for the king." Potholes were filled; bumps were smoothed. Hilltops were knocked down, valleys filled in. Wandering roads were made straight. The king was coming and nothing could be allowed to get in the way of the coming king; nothing could be allowed to slow down the coming king.

Now the voice in our lesson wasn't just "Prepare the way for the King" it was "**Prepare the way for the LORD**!" God was coming ... **and the glory of the LORD would be revealed**! When you think of the glory of the LORD, what do you think of? We might think of his awesome power, his awesome creation stretching out way past the stars; we might think of God in all his holiness shining brighter than the sun. And that's all part of God's glory; but the special glory of the LORD isn't just seen in his power and holiness; the special glory of the LORD isn't just God over us; the special glory of the LORD is God for us and with us - God stepping into history and coming to help his people!

Think of when God's people were slaves in Egypt, when God stepped into history, the glory of the LORD appeared to Moses in the burning bush, and God called Moses to lead his people out of Egypt. Then when God's people were starving in the Sinai desert, God again stepped into history and the glory of the LORD appeared when he promised manna and quail for his people. And when God's people rebelled against Moses, God stepped in, he showed his glory and saved Moses. At the tabernacle in the desert, at the temple in Jerusalem, God stepped in and showed his glory. And then 1000 years later on Christmas Eve, the glory of the Lord lit up the sky outside of Bethlehem and the angels told the shepherds that God had stepped into this world, our Savior was born. The glory of the Lord most often appeared as a bright light that would make people stop in their tracks and think, "God is here." Not just to "wow" his people. The glory of the LORD was God's sign he was stepping into history to save his people.

So in our lesson when Isaiah prophesies, **"the glory of the LORD will be revealed**," Isaiah was saying, God is coming to step in and save us. Isaiah was preaching an Advent sermon. God would come and save his people. First, God would step in and take a man named Cyrus and make him king over the Babylonian empire, the Babylonian empire that would destroy Jerusalem and take God's people captive. God would use great King Cyrus as his servant to set his people free and send them back home to Jerusalem.

That was part of Isaiah's Advent sermon - God was coming to set his people free! But that wasn't all of Isaiah's sermon. Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John all tell us the voice calling out in the wilderness was John the Baptist. Our lesson isn't just about God coming with servant King Cyrus; it is especially about God coming with his servant King Jesus Christ.

"And the glory of the LORD will be revealed." Not just with a bright light. Not just through a man like Moses or Cyrus. This time God himself would step into our history as one of us. How? - as the miracle baby born of a virgin. Filled with the power of the Holy Spirit, He would bring peace, and justice and righteousness to our world. He would be God's perfect obedient servant; the kind of servants we're supposed to be, but aren't. He would be God's specially chosen victim to carry our sin and die our death. He would be God's forever Prince of Peace who would rule over death and give us God's peace forever. In Jesus Christ, the glory of the Lord - not just the light of God, but the love of God - would be revealed. God would step in and intervene in the natural course of history and save his people from their sins.

That's in the past. What about today? The glory of the Lord will be revealed again. We're now living in the advent season of Christ's second coming. God will again step into the normal course of history to save his people. Christ will come again and he'll deliver us out of this world to live with him in heaven.

And so a voice calls out: **"in the desert prepare the way for the LORD; make straight in the wilderness a highway for our God**." What does that mean for us? God is not telling us to go out and fix our roads. Jesus doesn't need roads; he didn't come in on a road at Christmas; he doesn't come in on a road today; and he won't be coming in on a road when he comes back. So what is God saying?

John the Baptist took the words of our lesson and preached them with this one word, "**REPENT.**" Change your mind and change your life. Prepare to meet your Lord. Take a look at your life; take a look into your heart. What kind of road are you giving Jesus in your heart and mind? What's in there you don't want Jesus to see? What does Jesus want in your heart but it's not there?

We have some road construction to do in here, don't we? What are some of the potholes - holes in our heart - we face this time of year? With all the sales and commercials ... with the world around telling us: "You need more; you need more, you need more" it can be easy to have a hole in our heart that says: "I need more stuff; and if I don't get what I want, I can't be happy." Like getting stuff is more important than having Jesus and sharing Jesus.

What else can get in the way of Jesus this time of year? Oh, we can be so busy. Christmas lights and shopping and parties and on and on. Sometimes we fill our calendars so full, Jesus can't fit in (we don't let Jesus fit in); and then we get so stressed people around us can't see Jesus in us either. Or maybe what gets in the way of Jesus is the family get-together packed with years of baggage and feuds - we just wish they would let go, while we hold on.

What in your life gets in the way of Jesus filling your heart? What gets in the way of God showing his glory, his love and his grace through you? Those are the places to clear the way and let Jesus in. Let Jesus in and he will fill in those holes with peace and forgiveness and all the riches of God's love. And then what? Perhaps Christmas will feel a little less noisy and we'll better hear and better voice the wow of Jesus' birth. One more thought. What might be some things here at St. John that can get in the way of Jesus? How can we clear the way, make it easier to see the glory of our LORD here? I was talking with someone this past week, someone whose life has always been filled with noise, a lot of noise getting in the way of Jesus. He lives out of state now. He talked about something we've been talking about - friendliness and welcome. He said where he lives now, people are friendly and people are welcoming. To a point. The people are so busy and so tight with their friends that they have little to no room to let new people in as friends. Sound familiar? It could, it should; I hear the same thing in our part of the world. Do you see the hole, the opportunity there? It's great to be friendly, but to be a friend? That just might clear the way and be the way for Jesus to do his thing.

One more thought. Oops. I already said that. Did you notice the promise in our lesson? Isaiah didn't just say "do"; Isaiah also said it will be done. Clear the way for Jesus, and he will work his blessing! "Prepare the way for the LORD; and the glory of the LORD will be revealed!" Amen.

SERVICE OF THE WORD

IN OUR WORLD TODAY ... we hear so much noise that gets in the way of people hearing Jesus. Our world (and hearts) are filled with so many obstacles getting in the way of Jesus.

IN OUR WORSHIP TODAY ... we hear the voice that calls us to be ready for Jesus, and we hear God's promise that he will show his glory in Jesus!

INVOCATION

- M: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.
- C: Amen.

CONFESSION OF SINS AND LIGHTING RITE

- M: When God created the world, he made the crown of his creation the human race in his image (Genesis 1:26). Perfect people lived in a perfect world in a perfect relationship with God.
- C: But mankind rebelled against God, bringing sin into the world and death to all. God declared the wages of sin to be death (Romans 6:23). We too are guilty, and we confess our sinful thoughts, words, and actions.
- M: However, God who is Love did not want to be separated from his children forever. He promised a Savior who would bear the punishment for sin, defeat the devil, and break the bonds of death.





- M: When the time had fully come, God sent his Son. Jesus, our Savior, has paid the ransom for your debt; your sins are forgiven (Galatians 4:4,5). In view of God's mercy, today we light the peace candle. Jesus tells us, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not be afraid" (John 14:27).
- C: Since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ (Romans 5:1).



M: In the peace of God we go to the world - to our friends, relatives, acquaintances and neighbors. We regard no one from a worldly point of view. If anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come. All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation (2 Corinthians 5: 16-18).

C: God has committed to us the ministry of reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. Jesus, who had no sin, became sin for us; in him we have become the righteousness of God (2 Corinthians 5:19-21).



PRAYER OF THE DAY

Stir up our hearts, O Lord, to prepare the way for your only Son. By his coming, give us strength in our conflicts, and shed light on our path through the darkness of this world; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

2 Peter 3:8–14

But do not forget this one thing, dear friends: With the Lord a day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like a day. The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness.

Instead he is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance.

But the day of the Lord will come like a thief. The heavens will disappear with a roar; the elements will be destroyed by fire, and the earth and everything done in it will be laid bare.

Since everything will be destroyed in this way, what kind of people ought you to be? You ought to live holy and godly lives as you look forward to the day of God and speed its coming.
