"O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie." Do you know the story? In 1865, the year our Civil War came to an end, a pastor from Philadelphia makes his pilgrimage to the Holy Land. For Christmas Eve, he rides horseback to Bethlehem; he rides through the fields and hills around Bethlehem, then goes to church in Bethlehem. A couple year's later, back home, he writes, "O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie." The pastor who wrote the lyrics and the musician who composed the music figured the Sunday School would sing their Bethlehem Christmas carol that Sunday after Christmas, and then it would lie still never to be heard again. Instead we're still singing "O little town of Bethlehem" almost 160 years later.

The truth is: we don't know if Bethlehem was peaceful and still that night Jesus was born. We don't know if Bethlehem was small-town quiet, or if the local inn was throwing a shindig that night and that's why there was no room in the inn for Mary and Joseph. For that matter, we don't know if Micah thought of Bethlehem as quiet and peaceful.

Our lesson doesn't start off quiet and peaceful or in Bethlehem. We're in Jerusalem, the fortress city of Judah, the royal city of the rulers of Judah. And it's not quiet or peaceful. The bugles are blowing, the horns are calling the soldiers in. For what? At first, it seems to celebrate, to crush their enemies and to celebrate. God has gathered the enemies of his people together. God has made Jerusalem strong; he has made his people strong to stomp on and crush their enemies. But what's

the next thing we hear from Micah? "A siege is laid against us. They will strike Israel's ruler on the cheek with a rod." The enemies God would gather for Jerusalem to crush, first they would attack and surround Jerusalem and squeeze the life out of her. Before Jerusalem gets to celebrate, she would be shamed. As her rulers are slapped and shamed, she would be slapped and shamed. First it was the Assyrians, then the Babylonians (after Micah, one after another of Jerusalem's kings were taken captive to Babylon). Then it was the Moabites and Samaritans; then the Medes and Persians, then the Greeks with the Ptolemies and Seleucids and the Old Testament anti-christ Antiochus. (This past summer we heard about that from Daniel, Ezra, Nehemiah.) Just when things looked up with the Maccabees and Hanukkah, Jerusalem's leaders slapped and shamed themselves. Then it was the Romans with the Herods, then Pontius Pilate, and more Herods and Romans. Before Jerusalem would get to celebrate, she would be slapped and shamed.

As long as God's people wanted to play with the world, think and live like the world ... as long as God's people thought the powers of this world could make life right for them ... God would have them slapped and shamed by the world, slapped and shamed with the world. Jerusalem, the power of the people, could not and would not make life right for God's people. The power of Jerusalem, the power of the people, was in for a slapping and a shaming.

Dare I say: a nice reminder for us. If we think the powers of this world will make life right for us, like Jerusalem thought then, whatever powers of this world we think will make life right for us, however great and glorious they think they are, however great and glorious we might think they are - whoever looks to the powers of this world to make life right for them is in for a slapping and a shaming. God has a different way to make life right for his people.

"But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel" Today, Bethlehem struggles. It struggles as an Arab and Palestinian town in the Israeli-occupied West Bank. It struggles as Christians are squeezed out by more and more Jewish settlements squeezing in around them. It struggles to be seen as a safe and welcoming place for Christian tourists wanting to see "O Little Town of Bethlehem."

Back in the day of Micah, I don't know if there was much of a tourist trade. If Bethlehem had a "Welcome to Bethlehem" sign, on that sign could have been Bethlehem's claim to fame - "Birthplace of King David," and Bethlehem's claim to shame - "Population Too Small to Matter." Back in the time of Joshua when God's people first moved in, Bethlehem was too small to matter. Even after it became known as the birthplace of King David, at the time of Micah and later when Joseph and Mary were looking for a place to stay - Bethlehem was still too small to matter. Too small to matter in the eyes of the world, but not in the eyes of God.

Small-town Bethlehem is where God chose the youngest of Jesse's sons, the shepherd-boy David, to be king of his people. Small-town Bethlehem is the birthplace that God chose for the

birth of his own Son who would be the forever King of his people.

Micah tells us something about this future and forever Ruler King - his origins are from of old, from ancient times, from the days of eternity. Think about that. The future Ruler-King that God is promising is from the past, the ancient past, the forever days of eternity past. How can that be? We'll hear it on Christmas Eve. At the same time that Micah preached as God's prophet, Isaiah proclaimed God's sign: "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and will come him Immanuel." You know what Immanuel means - "God with us." Then Isaiah preached out: "For to us a chid is born, to us a son is given and he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace." How can Micah's future forever Ruler-King come from God's forever past? Micah's future forever Ruler-King is the Son of God, God himself.

And what will he do? I want to tell you. I want to skip over the next verse. In fact, some years on Christmas Eve I think I do skip the next verse. Why? Because it sounds so bittersweet. "Israel will be abandoned until the time when she who is in labor gives birth and the rest of his brothers return to join the Israelites." First, the bitter - "Israel will be abandoned." The northern ten tribes of Israel would be abandoned to the Assyrians and gone forever. The southern kingdom of Judah would be handed over to the Babylonians and then the Medes and Persians, then the Greeks, then the Romans. And then what? The sweet. Luke tells us: "In those days

Caesar Augustus issued a decree So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David He went there to register with Mary ... who was expecting a child. [And] while they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son." Sweet. And Micah has more sweetness for us - "the rest of his brothers [will] return to join the Israelites." That's us. That's you and me, God's gentile people, Jesus' gentile brothers and sisters. That's right, we get to see ourselves in our lesson; we get to see Micah's forever Ruler-King as our forever Ruler-King.

And what will he do? Now I get to tell. "He will stand and shepherd his flock in the strength of the LORD, in the majesty of the name of the LORD his God. And they will live securely, for then his greatness will reach to the ends of the earth. And he will be their peace." Remember the first line of our lesson? "Marshal your troops, o city of troops." Micah doesn't picture our Ruler-King as a soldier or even as a general, but as a shepherd. "He will stand and shepherd his flock in the strength of the LORD, in the majesty of the name of the LORD his God. And they will live securely, for then his greatness will reach to the ends of the earth. And he will be their peace."

Let there be no doubt. Micah is pointing to Jesus, the Good Shepherd himself. Listen to what Jesus says for you: "I am the Good Shepherd. I lay down my life for my sheep. ... My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; no one can

snatch them out of my hand." Our Good Shepherd lays down his life. As the Lamb of God he takes the sins, our sins, that would have God slapping and shaming us forever. And he is slapped and shamed on the cross for us. Then, as the Son of God he takes back his life, and instead of taking hold of our sins and holding them over us, he takes hold of us and holds us close to his heart - forgiven and right with God, forgiven for life with God.

"And he will be their peace." Sometimes I like to think of peace as an economy that watches out for me. Sometimes I like to think of peace as a health-care system that watches out for me. Sometimes I like to think of peace as my wife and my family and all of you, all my world, smiling at me. Micah points us to a better peace - Jesus. With Jesus we have a peace better than any power in this world, a peace better than any smile in this world. With Jesus we have peace and life with God - "The LORD is my Shepherd; I shall not want. ... Surely goodness and mercy will follow me all the days of my life and I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever." Amen.





- M: However, God who is Love did not want to be separated from his children forever. He promised a Savior who would bear the punishment for sin, defeat the devil, and break the bonds of death.





All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation (2 Corinthians 5: 16-18).

C: We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. Jesus, who had no sin, became sin for us; in him we have become the righteousness of God (2 Corinthians 5:19-21).
