Sermon followed by Service

December 3, 2023

Isaiah 40:1-2

Do you see the light at the end of the tunnel? I hope so. These past few weeks, Jesus has been giving us pictures. Here's a favorite -"Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away I saw the Holy City, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride beautifully dressed for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Now the dwelling of God is with men, and he will live with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God. He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away."

Do you see the light at the end of the tunnel? How about the tunnel? Dark and crushing. Dark and oppressive. Dark and sucking the light and the life out of you. Do you see and feel yourself in the tunnel? This might sound strange - I hope so. I hope so, because if you're thinking that life is fine just the way it is, and that you are fine just the way you are, then our lesson won't mean much to you. And worse, the light at the end of the tunnel won't mean much to you.

Do you see the tunnel, the tunnel of trouble you're going through? I don't know your darkness as well as I'd like, but I have some idea. Breaking and broken bodies, cancers, depression, dementia. Families, friends, jobs that turn against you. A world of evil around us, darkening, crushing our spirits. A world of evil inside us, twisting and torturing our spirits. We feel the tunnel, don't we? Otherwise, why would we be here?

{Skipped in the Preaching}

In our lesson, the LORD through Isaiah shows us the light at the end of the tunnel. It's about 700 years before Jesus was born. The Northern Kingdom of Israel is gone. They refused to listen to God, so in 722 BC, God worked his promised judgment. The Assyrians came in, crushed Israel, and scattered into exile most of the survivors - the Ten Lost Tribes - never to return. Next it looks like it's Jerusalem's turn. Like Israel, Judah and Jerusalem would rather live the life of the world than listen to God. The "haves" squeezed the "have-nots." For many, the sex gods of the world were the way to live life. For most, the ways of the world seemed better than the ways of God. For most of Isaiah's ministry, in Judah and Jerusalem, king (even godly King Hezekiah) and country followed the ways of the world instead of listening to God. So in 701 BC, God brought back the Assyrians. They destroyed the main cities of Judah; they took tens of thousands into exile; they surrounded and laid siege to Jerusalem. It looked like what the Assyrians did to Samaria in the north, they would do to Jerusalem in the south. But, finally, Hezekiah turned to the LORD instead of looking to the world to save him. And God kept his promise; the LORD delivered. The angel of the LORD struck down 185,000 in the Assyrian camp, and the Assyrians went back home.

Was it light at the end of the tunnel? After what the Assyrians had been doing, when the Assyrians left, it might have felt that way. But in Judah and Jerusalem, king and country didn't learn their lesson. They continued to look to the ways of the world instead of following the ways of God. And so God promised another tunnel of trouble the Babylonians would come. The people and power that king and country trusted more than God would either let them down or turn against them. Everything they loved more than God would be taken away or destroyed. Their pride and joy would be turned to shame. Another tunnel of trouble was coming. Worse than the last.

Another tunnel of trouble was coming for Judah and Jerusalem. And what about today? Another tunnel of trouble is coming for us. Everything and everyone we trust more than God will either let us down or turn against us or both. Everything and everyone we love more than God will be taken away. Our pride and joy in the things of this world, our pride and joy in the things of self, will be turned to shame. Another tunnel of trouble is coming for the world out there. Another tunnel of trouble is coming for you and for me.

{Back to the Preaching}

That's not what we came to hear, is it? So listen to what our LORD has for us - light at the end of the tunnel.

"Comfort, comfort my people,' says your God." I have to stop there. When you're in a tunnel of trouble, does it ever feel like God has left you, turned his back on you, maybe even turned against you? Listen to the pronouns - "Comfort, comfort my people,' says your God." This is after Judah and Jerusalem left God to follow the world, after Judah and Jerusalem left God to satisfy self, after Judah and Jerusalem shut their ears to God to listen to themselves and the world around them. And yet what? Listen for the pronouns -"Comfort, comfort my people,' says your God."

When you're in a tunnel of trouble, and you're feeling like God has left you, listen for the pronouns in God's Word and Sacrament. In baptism, God says: "Kevin Paul Raddatz - go ahead, put your name in there - I baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." Why? So that with you covered with Jesus and connected by the Spirit, God the Father can say to you: "You are my son, my daughter, whom I love; with you I am well-pleased." When you're in a tunnel of trouble, and you're feeling like God has left you, listen for the pronouns in the Lord's Supper: "**This is my blood of the covenant given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins.**" What covenant is Jesus pointing you to? God's promise: "**I will be your God, and you will be my people**." "I will be your God to watch out for you, to take care of you, to bless you. You will be my people to love and hold close today and forever."

When God says "my" and "your," he's not speaking as boss and master. He's speaking as a loving Father, a loving husband. "**Speak tenderly**;" "**Speak to the heart**." He's not looking just to have you fall into line; he's looking to win your heart, to comfort your heart.

And what does God say to comfort his people? "**Speak** tenderly to Jerusalem, and proclaim to her that her hard service has been completed, that her sin has been paid for, that she has received from the LORD's hand double for all her sins." When I read those words all on their own, they don't do much to comfort me. Why? On their own, this is what they sound like to me: "I'm supposed to feel comforted because I've done my time, so my sins are paid for, in fact, God has made me pay double for all my sins." To have a God who makes me pay double for my sins isn't all that comforting. To have God say that "my hard service has been completed," when I'm still in a tunnel of trouble - how is that comforting? How is that even true?

On their own, these words of comfort don't sound at all comforting. But these words aren't on their own. These words are an outline for the rest of the book of Isaiah. With these words God is pointing ahead; pointing ahead to what he will promise; pointing ahead to what he will do to keep his promise; pointing ahead to the light at the end of the tunnel. We might wonder, "If he's pointing ahead, then why does he talk like he's pointing back, talking in the past tense?" Because that's how sure God is about his promise; that's how sure God is about what he will do; that's how sure God is about the light at the end of the tunnel - it's as good as done.

So what does God see as good as done? "Your hard service is completed." It may not look or feel that way. But God sees the end of your troubles. You get to see the end of your troubles. God sees the end of your time on evil's battlefield, beaten up and beaten down. He sees the end of your time on his potter's wheel - thrown down and squeezed, pressured and re-formed. God sees the end. Your troubles won't go on forever; their end is coming. God will deliver.

Why? God doesn't see you as his enemy, you're his people. God doesn't see you as guilty; he sees you with your sin paid for. How? Not by your hard service, not by your troubles. Go to Isaiah 53. If Isaiah had put this on a web page instead of on a scroll, he might have had this underlined, in color, with a link, so that when we clicked on "her sin has been paid for" a picture of Jesus on the cross would pop up on our screen and we would go right to Isaiah 53: "Surely he took up our infirmities and carried our sorrows he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed. ⁶ We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to his own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all." Our sin is paid for because Jesus has taken our sin and paid for it. What does that mean for us? You are forgiven, forgiven for life right with God, forgiven for life the way it's supposed to be.

Life the way it's supposed to be, not the way we deserve it to be (that would be hell), but life the way God wants it to be. That's where Isaiah takes us next. When Isaiah says: "she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins," "she" means Jerusalem, the city and people of God. With Jesus, that's you. When Isaiah says: "received double for all her sins," he doesn't mean double punishment; he's talking about double blessing. Instead of making us pay for our sin, God gives us blessing, double blessing, the blessing that goes to the favorite child. Just as God sees the end of your trouble ... just as God sees your sin paid for ... so God sees you paid double for all your trouble. Double comfort for all the times the devil tore at you. Double comfort for all the times the world knocked you around. Double comfort for all the times God came down on you with his hand of judgment and discipline. God has for you double comfort, comfort here in this life, and comfort for you forever in heaven. Why? Jesus.

During this season of Advent, sometimes it can seem like the light at the end of the tunnel is Christmas. Isaiah gives us better than just Christmas; he takes us to the cross and to Easter. He doesn't just promise deliverance from our tunnel of troubles in this world, he promises a new life in heaven, life the way that it is supposed to be. So what do we say? "**Come, Lord Jesus**." Amen.

THE SERVICE

IN OUR WORLD TODAY ... what do people see as "the light at the end of the tunnel"? What reason do people have that they will get to "the light at the end of the tunnel"?

IN OUR WORSHIP TODAY ... we see "the light at the end of the tunnel," and we are given good reason, God's reason, promising how and why we will get to the end of the tunnel.

INVOCATION

- M: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.
- C: Amen.

CONFESSION OF SINS AND LIGHTING RITE

- M: When God created the world, he made the crown of his creation the human race in his image (Genesis 1:26). Perfect people lived in a perfect world in a perfect relationship with God.
- C: But mankind rebelled against God, bringing sin into the world and death to all. God declared the wages of sin to be death (Romans 6:23). We too are guilty, and we confess our sinful thoughts, words, and actions.
- M: However, God who is Love did not want to be separated from his children forever. He promised a Savior who would bear the punishment for sin, defeat the devil, and break the bonds of death.



- M: When the time had fully come, God sent his Son. Jesus, our Savior, has paid the ransom for your debt; your sins are forgiven (Galatians 4:4,5). In view of God's mercy, today we light the hope candle. The Spirit declares through the psalmist, "Put your hope in the Lord, for with the Lord is unfailing love, and with him is full redemption" (Psalm 130:7).
- C: We wait for the Lord, and in his word we put our hope (Psalm 130:5).



- M: In the hope of God we go to the world to our friends, relatives, acquaintances and neighbors. We regard no one from a worldly point of view. If anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come. All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation (2 Corinthians 5: 16-18).
- C: God has committed to us the ministry of reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. Jesus, who had no sin, became sin for us; in him we have become the righteousness of God (2 Corinthians 5:19-21).

Stir up your power, O Lord, and come. Protect us by your strength, and save us from the threatening dangers of our sins; for you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

SERMON

Isaiah 40:1-2

NICENE CREED
