Sermon followed by Service

February 25, 2024 - God-Lived Life – 4

Luke 16:1-15

It's a head-scratcher, isn't it? So many questions. Questions that don't matter, like - If the master was firing his business manager for wasting his money, why did he give him more time to cheat him? And questions that do matter - Why did the master commend his cheating business manager? What does Jesus mean by "use money to gain friends to welcome you into heaven"? What does Jesus mean by "you cannot serve both God and mammon" and "What is valued highly by men is detested by God"? Oh, and there's another important question, isn't there? Where do you see yourself in this story?

A wealthy businessman had a business manager accused of wasting the business owner's money. The business owner fires his business manager, but first, the business manager needs to give an accounting.

So far, who do you want to be in this story? We don't want to be the business owner, do we? I imagine most all of us have had someone cheat us. And it hurts. We give someone an opportunity, we trust them, and they cheat us. It hurts; it makes us angry - angry and hurt. We understand why that business owner would be angry, don't we? We don't want to be him.

And we don't want to face him. That would be the business manager, trusted with the owner's business, trusted with the owner's riches. He could have had it really good. But what

do we hear? He's wasted the money entrusted to him. He cheated his boss. And now he's fired, and on the line to have to give an account. We don't want to be him, do we? We don't want to be fired. And the thought of having to give account for the money God has entrusted to me ... the thought of having to give account for the work that God has entrusted to me - it sets me on edge, makes me feel tight and twisted inside. What I see undone, what he sees undone; what I see wasted, what he sees wasted - it sets me on edge, wondering, waiting - "how, when will the hammer drop?" How, when will we have to give account?

We want to hear Jesus say something soft and comfortable about money and money management, don't we? No, we want to hear Jesus say something soft and comfortable about money and money mismanagement. But Jesus doesn't. Remember, he's the Jesus who looked forward to the cross and said to his disciples: "Deny yourselves." "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me." And here what does Jesus say? "You cannot serve both God and **Money**." I prefer that old word "mammon"; Jesus isn't just talking about money; he's talking about stuff and the moneyd life. "You cannot serve both God and stuff; you cannot serve both God and the moneyd life." "If you have not been trustworthy in handling worldly wealth, who will trust you with true riches?" If God can't trust us with \$100, or \$1, why would God trust us with something that really matters? "God knows your hearts. What is highly valued among men is detestable in God's sight." The things of this world that people long for and chase after, God thinks of them as an abomination.

Makes us wonder, doesn't it? How often does God see us squandering his money to chase after what he thinks is worthless, and worse than worthless? How, when will the hammer drop?

In our lesson, we hear the hammer drop - the business manager was fired - with more to come - now he has to give account. So what does he do? He doesn't try to make things right his boss. Instead, he turns to the world, to make friends with the world. If cheating his boss had gotten him into trouble, he figures that cheating his boss could get him out of his trouble. Once we get into a rut, it's hard to get out of that rut, isn't it?. It's so easy to think that what got us into trouble is what we can use to get out of trouble. So, if playing fast and loose with his boss's money had gotten himself into trouble, he figured playing fast and loose with his boss's money just might make it easier for him to get out of his trouble.

How did it work out for him? That's not a question Jesus answers, at least not directly. Instead, Jesus gets us scratching our heads. Jesus has the cheated business owner commending, praising, his cheating business manager. What did Jesus say? "The master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly." And we scratch our heads: What's up with that? Did you notice? The master didn't commend and praise his manager for cheating him. The master didn't say the manager did right. Instead the master commended his manager as shrewd. The manager saw a problem, and he got right after doing something to fix it. More specifically, the manager realized he could use money to make connections that could help him - and he got right after it.

Then did you notice what Jesus did? He moved on from his "business" story so no one would be tempted to write a book: "Jesus Teaches Top Ten Lessons for Business People." Jesus moved on from his business story to his heavenly point: "I tell you, use worldly wealth to gain friends for yourselves, so that when it is gone, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings." The cheating business manger used money (that wasn't his) to make connections, to make friends, so he would be welcomed here in this world. Jesus takes it up a notch - use money to make connections, to make friends, who will welcome you into heaven.

Here's the lesson Jesus has for us. Use the money God has given you for a purpose - Not just for yourselves, but for others. Not just for here and now, but for forever. In other words, use the money God has given you - not just as yours for your purposes, but as God's for God's purposes.

We hear that and what? There's that two year old in us that shouts and tantrums: "No, it's mine!" But we aren't ruled by the two-year-old in us, are we? We have Jesus and his Spirit in us. And with Jesus and his Spirit, the thought of putting God's money to God's purposes doesn't leave us feeling cheated or victimized; we are excited.

It's so neat to think about, isn't it? Last week our mission festival speaker told us how we - with our offerings - are sharing Jesus in a part of the world known for trying to silence Jesus. Think about it, as we put God's money to God's work with our offerings, we will have people welcoming us into heaven who were at one time Taliban. We will have people welcoming us

into heaven who were at one time locked up as slaves. Or closer to home, we will have people welcoming us into heaven because they got to know Jesus here or in our school. Or out and about, you will have people welcoming you into heaven because you showed them kindness, not just in words, but you put God's money to work to show kindness, and that had them wanting to know the Jesus in your heart. Yes, we will have people welcoming us into heaven, many of whom we will have never met before, but your offerings here are making it possible for people on the other side of the world - or on the other side of that wall (in school) - or out and about Your offerings here and your kindnesses out there are making it possible for people to hear about Jesus, and some day they will welcome you into heaven. Sounds good, doesn't it?

So who do you want to be in Jesus' story? Not the cheated business owner. Not the cheating business manager waiting to give account, waiting for the hammer to drop. How about this - the one Jesus is including. He includes us with a warning for the two year old inside us. You remember that two year old shouting: "No, it's mine." He's not happy, is he? But we don't have to live the life of a two year old. Jesus has included us in his grace; he's included us in his purpose. "You know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich."

What does that mean for us? We don't have to live waiting for a hammer to drop, because the hammer has already dropped, driving the nails into Jesus' hands and feet. There on the cross, Jesus was hung out with nothing to his name but your guilt, our guilt and shame. There Jesus was hung out with nothing to hold on to but God's promise and his love for you. There Jesus gave account for you and for me, and that whole world. There he paid the price - not with cash or credit, but with his life and death.

Why? So God can see you and include you - not as someone who cheated him, but as forgiven full and free. So God can include you - not under the hammer - but in heaven. So God can include you - not with the cheaters - but with those he trusts with his riches.

So who do you want to be in Jesus' story? Who do we want to be? The ones Jesus includes. The ones sharing Jesus' heart. The ones Jesus trusts, right?! Amen!

GOSPEL Luke 16:1–15

Jesus tells a parable about a shrewd manager to make the single point that a God-lived life uses its resources for God's purposes.

Jesus told his disciples: "There was a rich man whose manager was accused of wasting his possessions. So he called him in and asked him, 'What is this I hear about you? Give an account of your management, because you cannot be manager any longer.'

"The manager said to himself, 'What shall I do now? My master is taking away my job. I'm not strong enough to dig, and I'm ashamed to beg— I know what I'll do so that, when I lose my job here, people will welcome me into their houses.'

"So he called in each one of his master's debtors. He asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?'

"'Nine hundred gallons of olive oil,' he replied.

"The manager told him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it four hundred and fifty.'

"Then he asked the second, 'And how much do you owe?'

"'A thousand bushels of wheat,' he replied.

"He told him, 'Take your bill and make it eight hundred.'

"The master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly. For the people of this world are more shrewd in dealing with their own kind than are the people of the light. I tell you, use worldly wealth to gain friends for yourselves, so that when it is gone, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings.

"Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much. So if you have not been trustworthy in handling worldly wealth, who will trust you with true riches? And if you have not been trustworthy with someone else's property, who will give you property of your own?

"No one can serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and money."

The Pharisees, who loved money, heard all this and were sneering at Jesus. He said to them, "You are the ones who justify yourselves in the eyes of others, but God knows your hearts. What people value highly is detestable in God's sight.

BIBLE STUDY 1 Timothy 6:6-19

⁶ But godliness with contentment is great gain. ⁷ For we brought nothing into the world, and we can take nothing out of it. ⁸ But if we have food and clothing, we will be content with that. ⁹ Those who want to get rich fall into temptation and a trap and into many foolish and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. ¹⁰ For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil. Some people, eager for money, have wandered from the faith and pierced themselves with many griefs.

¹¹ But you, man of God, flee from all this, and pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance and gentleness. ¹² Fight the good fight of the faith. Take hold of the eternal life to which you were called when you

made your good confession in the presence of many witnesses. ¹³ In the sight of God, who gives life to everything, and of Christ Jesus, who while testifying before Pontius Pilate made the good confession, I charge you ¹⁴ to keep this command without spot or blame until the appearing of our Lord Jesus Christ, ¹⁵ which God will bring about in his own time—God, the blessed and only Ruler, the King of kings and Lord of lords, ¹⁶ who alone is immortal and who lives in unapproachable light, whom no one has seen or can see. - 4. In verses 17-19, Paul lists two dangers when God blesses someone with wealth and then describes the best way to use your wealth. Identify the two dangers and how one should use their wealth?
