Sermon Followed by Service

June 2, 2024 Dan

I'm a little nervous. Last week I preached on the voice of the LORD, thunder and lightning, storms with tornado power all around. And do you remember what we heard last Sunday night? Thunder rumbling and rolling with tornado sirens sounding all around. This week I preach on something that sounds worse. Not just thunder and lightning and storms all around, but God giving his people over into the hands of the enemy. And part of me wonders: "When? When will it be my turn?" That's not something we want to think about, is it? But then we would miss out on some of our favorite lessons, like the Three Men in the Fiery Furnace and Daniel in the Lion's Den.

What do you look forward to hearing about in our series "Daniel in the Lion's World"?

So what do you do? What do you do when your world falls apart? What do you do when your world is against you? What do you do?

What do you do?

That was the question facing Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego. It's 605 BC, six hundred years before Jesus was born, and it looked like he would never be born. It looked like God would never send the Forever King he promised to David and

Solomon and to you. If you're Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach, or Abednego, your king doesn't care about God; some days he might pretend, but he doesn't really care about God and the Christ, his promised Forever King Jesus. All he cares about is doing his own thing - living the life of the world. And he's leading more and more people to think the same way. Now God has had enough. Through Jeremiah, he's given his warning in words: "Repent or else!" He's given his warning in action: when the northern ten tribes of Israel didn't listen, God handed them over to the Assyrians never to return. But Judah and Jerusalem wouldn't listen, so God handed them over to Nebuchadnezzar and the Babylonians.

What warnings has the LORD given us?

Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego were among those God gave over to the Nebuchadnezzar and the Babylonians. What do you do if you're them? One day, you're a somebody in Judah and Jerusalem; you're part of the royal family. And then the enemy that has laid waste to so much of your countryside takes you captive, hostage, and drags you from your homeland 900 hundred some miles to the home of your enemy. Your old life is over, gone; your new world is against you and most everything you stand for. What do you do?

Imagine yourself a teenager taken from your home, taken to (the capital of your enemy). What goes through your mind?

You can do what so many others were doing. You can blame God and his prophets. You can lie and deny. You can

look for a strong man who says what you want to hear to save you. That's what so many people were doing back home in Judah and Jerusalem. Or you can hang your head in defeat, sit and weep, and call on God to strike down and crush the Babylonians and their babies. That's what we hear so many of Daniel's fellow captives doing in Psalm 137.

What does Psalm 137 teach us about facing disaster / disappointment? What about disaster/disappointment brought about by an enemy?

Or we can do the American patriot thing; we can think ourselves right and fight to the end. We can do what comes naturally; we can play the victim; we can play the hero; we can pick at our hurts and get angry and fight and hate and fight some more. I can imagine myself doing most all of those things.

Which of those responses to disaster / disappointment come naturally to you?

Or we can do what Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego did. When Daniel writes about his predicament, he doesn't whine and complain; he doesn't lie and deny; he doesn't make himself out to be the victim of some great injustice. He doesn't blame God. Read chapter 9. Daniel confesses that with

Judah and Jerusalem he deserved God's judgment. So when Daniel writes that the Lord "gave" Judah's king into the hand of Nebuchadnezzar, Daniel wasn't blaming God; Daniel was giving credit to God. Daniel wasn't in captivity because of Nebuchadnezzar; Daniel was in captivity because God gave him over to captivity. So Daniel didn't seek to subvert Nebuchadnezzar and the government that God put over him; Daniel set out to serve the government that God put over him - even though they were the enemy of his people, even though they were against him and his way of life and his beliefs. Why would Daniel serve such a government, a government opposed to his Lord? Because God had made it clear to the exiles that they weren't in Babylon to fight the Babylonians, but they were there to serve the government that God had chosen to rule over them.

Why would God want his people to serve the enemy? What might that mean for us?

I imagine some might have thought Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego to be traitors. But Daniel wasn't hung up on national pride; he knew how ungodly his people could be; he knew how wrong his people could be. Instead, Daniel knew he had a greater King and kingdom. And in allegiance to that greater King and kingdom, Daniel was determined - no matter how his old life was in ruins, no matter how his new world was set against him - Daniel was determined to dedicate his life - not to reliving the past, and not to fighting the present, but - to showing the greater glory of his Lord and King.

Where do we see that same attitude in our country today? (Trick?)

Now, please don't get the idea that Daniel just rolled over and played Babylonian. Nebuchadnezzar tried to turn Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego into Babylonians. He tried to buy their allegiance with the best of foods and the best of wines. He set them up with new names pointing to the Babylonian gods. But Daniel couldn't be so easily bought or turned away from God. He set his mind to remain true to the Word and ways of God - even if it meant sacrifice and danger.

What does the "Ruler of the Kingdom of the Air" use to distract you from your allegiance to the Lord and his Kingdom?

And what happened? God blessed! In a world set against God's Word and God's ways, God gave Daniel strength and courage to stand up for God's Word and ways. And we don't want to miss this - with courage and strength, God also gave Daniel the wisdom to speak with gentleness and respect. Instead of looking for a fight, Daniel looked to be faithful. And God blessed. God blessed Daniel and Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego in their giving up for God; he blessed them on their vegetable and water diet to be healthier than those indulging on the king's diet. At the same time, God blessed them as they

studied to serve Nebuchadnezzar; after three years of training to serve the king, the king found them ten times better than all his magicians and spell casters.

We might wonder: "Nice story, but what does that have to do with us." Again and again in our lesson, Daniel tells us: "God gave." When life goes bad, when our world is against us - what is so easy to think? How we are missing out; how God is holding back from us; how God is taking from us. Daniel teaches us to look for how God is giving. Even when life goes bad, even when our world is against us, we get to know we have a God who is giving to us and giving for us. I said it last week; I'll say it again this week: "He sets a table before us even in the presence of our enemies." Even in our trouble, even when it seems our world is against us, God is giving all things to work for our good.

When Daniel wrote our lesson, Daniel already knew how God was working all things, not only for his good, but for our good. But when Daniel was living our lesson, he didn't yet know how God would give and work his good. In the same way, when life goes bad for us, when it seems our world is against us, we might not yet know how God will give and work his good. But we do know this - we have a God who - in the midst of trouble, when life seems to be going wrong, when our world seems to be against us - we have a God who gives and works his good.

How do you know you have a God who gives and works his good even in trouble?

How do we know that? We know how God gave and worked his blessing in the life of Daniel. And better, we know how God gave and worked his blessing in the life of Jesus. In a world that had gone wrong, in a world that had turned against him, God so loved the world that he gave - "he gave his one and only Son that whoever believes in him shall not perish, but have eternal life." We'll hear from Daniel about that Son in later chapters. But I don't want to steal Daniel's thunder. So let me tell you this - For the times we have chosen the life of the world instead of God's life, for the times God could give us over to judgment, God gave us Jesus to take our place, to take our sin, to take the judgment we deserve. Why? To give. To give us his forgiveness and peace. But God doesn't just give us forgiveness and leave us to fend for ourselves. For the times our life has gone bad, God is giving us Jesus with his promise of life made right. For the times our world seems to be against us, God is giving us Jesus ruling for us. Why? Not just to give us comfort and convenience; not just to set us up for the good life out there. But to give us what we need for a far better life, to set us up as his people shining his light, working his blessing - in here and out there - like Daniel, and Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego. Amen

How is God setting you up to be like Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego?

FIRST READING Daniel 1

In the third year of the reign of Jehoiakim king of Judah, Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon came to Jerusalem and besieged it. And the Lord delivered Jehoiakim king of Judah into his hand, along with some of the articles from the temple of God. These he carried off to the temple of his god in Babylonia and put in the treasure house of his god. Then the king ordered Ashpenaz, chief of his court officials, to bring into the king's service some of the Israelites from the royal family and the nobility—young men without any physical defect, handsome, showing aptitude for every kind of learning, well informed, quick to understand, and qualified to serve in the king's palace. He was to teach them the language and literature of the Babylonians. The king assigned them a daily amount of food and wine from the king's table. They were to be trained for three years, and after that they were to enter the king's service.

Among those who were chosen were some from Judah: Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah. The chief official gave them new names: to Daniel, the name Belteshazzar; to Hananiah, Shadrach; to Mishael, Meshach; and to Azariah, Abednego.

But Daniel resolved not to defile himself with the royal food and wine, and he asked the chief official for permission not to defile himself this way. Now God had caused the official to show favor and compassion to Daniel, but the official told Daniel, "I am afraid of my lord the king, who has assigned your food and drink. Why should he see you looking worse than the other young men your age? The king would then have my head because of you."

Daniel then said to the guard whom the chief official had appointed over Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah, "Please test your servants for ten days: Give us nothing but vegetables to eat and water to drink. Then compare our appearance with that of the young men who eat the royal food, and treat your servants in accordance with what you see." So he agreed to this and tested them for ten days.

At the end of the ten days they looked healthier and better nourished than any of the young men who ate the royal food. So the guard took away their choice food and the wine they were to drink and gave them vegetables instead.


To these four young men God gave knowledge and understanding of all kinds of literature and learning. And Daniel could understand visions and dreams of all kinds.

At the end of the time set by the king to bring them into his service, the chief official presented them to Nebuchadnezzar.

The king talked with them, and he found none equal to Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah; so they entered the king's service. In every matter of wisdom and understanding about which the king questioned them, he found them ten times better than all the magicians and enchanters in his whole kingdom.

And Daniel remained there until the first year of King Cyrus.

Hear our prayer.




LORD'S PRAYER
