Sermon followed by Service

August 18, 2024

Joshua 1:1-9

Have you ever stood at the edge of the Grand Canyon? It's different, isn't it? You stand at the edge, at the overlook, and look out, and what do you see? "Wow!" And maybe: "Wouldn't it be great to run the river, to hike to the bottom and look up at the Grand Canyon walls all around you?" But mostly, what do you see? "Wow!" But if instead of at the edge of the overlook, you're at the edge, at the trail head, what do you see? You see the "wow!" But you also see the warning signs, the danger signs. You hear the stories of people who had to be helped out, saved out. You see the faces of some of those climbing out and you don't see "Wow," you see exhaustion and pain. And now standing at the edge, as you "wow!" you might also be thinking: "Do we have what it takes? Do we have enough? Enough water, enough Cliff Bars? Will I make it? Will I be able to keep up? How far will I get before my knees go bad? Do I have what it takes?" To stand at the edge and just look out ... to stand at the edge before hitting the trail - it's different, isn't it?

Joshua was standing at the edge ... the edge of the Promised Land. He wasn't just at the overlook looking out: "Wow!" He was at the trail head. He had been there before. Forty years before, he had spied out the Promised Land. He had wowed at the land and the rivers, the milk and the honey, the fruit and the plenty - "Look what God has for us!" And he had seen the warning signs, the danger signs - so many people, so many ungodly peoples to overcome. He had seen the warning signs, the danger signs, and they weren't just out there - Joshua's people liked comfort and convenience; they were easily distracted by the world around; challenges for them were interesting, exciting, until ... they weren't. And then what? How far would they go? Did they have what it takes? Would he have what it takes? Would they make it to what God had for them?

What fears hold you back from serving together with God?

Joshua was standing at the edge - not just the edge of the Promised Land, but the edge of a new life, a new job, new opportunities, new challenges. What was going through his mind? I can't say we know, but we do know what God put in his mind. "As I was with Moses, so I will be with you; I will never leave you nor forsake you. "Be strong and courageous, because you will lead these people to inherit the land I swore to their forefathers to give them. … Be strong and courageous. Do not be terrified; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go."

Joshua was standing at the edge, and God gave him a promise. Today, Dave and Liz are standing at the edge, the edge of a new time of ministry. What's going through their minds? ... through your minds? I don't know for sure. I imagine some "Wow! Look what God has for me!" And I imagine you see some danger signs, some warning signs. As you "wow!," as you come across danger signs and warning signs, here's what God says to you: "**Be strong and courageous. Do not be terrified;**

do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go."

Today, Rose and Charlie and Bobbi are standing at the edge, the edge of a new time of ministry with us. What's going through their minds? ... your minds? I don't know for sure. I imagine some "Wow! Look what God has for me!" And I imagine you see some danger signs, some warning signs. As you "wow!," as you come across the danger and the warning signs, here's what God says to you: "**Be strong and courageous. Do not be terrified; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go.**"

Today, we're standing at the edge, the edge of a new time of ministry for us at St. John. What's going through our minds? I sure hope we have a sense of "Wow! Look what God has for us!" And I imagine we also see some danger signs, some warning signs. We know some of our challenges; we know something of ourselves, don't we? Here's what God says to us so we can face our challenges and take hold of his blessings: "Be strong and courageous. Do not be terrified; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go."

As Joshua stood at the edge, God didn't just give a promise, did he? God gave Joshua something more. God gave Joshua a map, a set of boundaries, a safety net, a tether. And he does the same for us in here [Bible]. Here God gives us his map showing where he is, showing the way to his blessings. Here he sets some boundaries, shows us some warning signs, some danger signs - showing us where not to go, what not to do, and just as important, how not to be. Here God gives us a safety net for when we fall; here he gives us a clean-up kit for when we slip into the muck. Here he gives us a tether to keep us close to him. Here God gives us his heart, as here he gives us Jesus.

In our new life, of what can we be sure? Just as in our past, there will be times we go where we shouldn't go. Times we go without God. Times we slip and fall into the muck of sin and guilt. Times we fall or get knocked down. With Jesus, of what can we be sure? In Jesus, not only do you have God's Good Shepherd to lead you and guide you, to feed you and protect you, in Jesus you have the Lamb of God to take away your sin and guilt. Yes, you have Jesus for you. You have his death on the cross covering your faults and your failures; you have his death paying for your sin full and free and forever. And in baptism, you have his life, perfect in every way, covering you right with God.

What does that mean for you? Every morning, as you stand on the edge of a new day with God, you get to hear for yourself our Father's baptism promise: "You are my son, my daughter whom I love; with you I am well pleased." With that promise, every morning, you get to hear God speak to you: "Be strong and courageous. Do not be terrified; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go."

And every night, every night as we share our day's hurts, with Jesus we get to hear his invitation and promise: "**Come to me all you who are weary and burdened and I will give you** rest." Every night, as we share our day's faults and failures, with Jesus we get to hear his promise: "Your sins are forgiven you; you are forgiven!" And when the fault and the failure and the blame really don't belong with us, but still there's fault and failure and fear, we get to hear his promise and invitation: "Be still and know that I am God. I will be exalted, I will have my way; I'll make things right for you." Sounds good, doesn't it? But, at the end of the day, it's not all bad, is it? Every night with Jesus, as we share our day's joys and accomplishments, we get to hear his joy and invitation and promise: "Well done, good and faithful servant. Come and share your master's happiness."

All of that and so much more is found for you in here [Bible] - the tether that keeps you connected with God and his promise.

So how did it all work out for Joshua and his people? God stopped the Jordan River and Joshua and his people crossed into the Promised Land. Then, just as God promised, the walls of Jericho fell. But just as God warned, when the people got distracted by the things of the world, when the people did things their way instead of God's way, when the people quit because God's way was too hard, because God's way cost too much time or effort - then what? Then God's people found out that God doesn't bless putting him off to the side for the things of the world, and God doesn't bless laziness and quitting for the comfortable and convenient; God blesses hard work, hard trusting, and, yes, hard sacrifice.

We get to know - God does bless. One of the things that makes God's Joshua 1:9 promise so special is this - it doesn't just sound good; God makes it good - God is good to his word! We jump from our lesson at the beginning of Joshua to the end of Joshua. Joshua is no longer standing on the edge of the Promised Land; he's standing in the Promised Land on the edge of the better Promised Land. Instead of God promising Joshua, we have Joshua speaking to his people: "I am about to go the way of all the earth. You know with all your heart and soul that not one of all the good promises the LORD your God gave you has failed. Every promise has been fulfilled; not one has failed." As we stand on the edge of something new, what do we get to know? Our God keeps his promises - and this is his promise "Be strong and courageous. Do not be terrified; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go."

What do you notice about that promise? It's not just a promise for standing at the edge looking out, is it? It's a promise for standing at the edge of the trail head, and then hitting the trail. It's not just a promise for looking out at the future. It's a promise for taking hold of the new life God has for us, and then getting out and living that new life God has for us.

To stand at the edge and just look ... to stand at the edge and then climb in - it's different, isn't it? To stand at the edge of the trail head, and then to hit the trail brings a whole different level of wow, excitement, anticipation ... and then, a whole different level of fulfillment. God is giving us a new time of ministry. Let's not just look and hope. Let's grab hold of his promise and hit the trail. Amen. *How will you grab hold of God's promise and join him in ministry?*



After the death of Moses the servant of the LORD, the LORD said to Joshua son of Nun, Moses' aide: "Moses my servant is dead. Now then, you and all these people, get ready to cross the Jordan River into the land I am about to give to them—to the Israelites. I will give you every place where you set your foot, as I promised Moses. Your territory will extend from the desert to Lebanon, and from the great river, the Euphrates—all the Hittite country—to the Mediterranean Sea in the west. No one will be able to stand against you all the days of your life. As I was with Moses, so I will be with you; I will never leave you nor forsake you. Be strong and courageous, because you will lead these people to inherit the land I swore to their ancestors to give them.

"Be strong and very courageous. Be careful to obey all the law my servant Moses gave you; do not turn from it to the right or to the left, that you may be successful wherever you go. Keep this Book of the Law always on your lips; meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do everything written in it. Then you will be prosperous and successful. Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go."

Joshua 1:1-9

NICENE CREED

M: Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ said to his Church: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me.

Exhortation to the Teachers-Elect

M: Dave, St. John Evangelical Lutheran Church has called you to serve as Principal and Staff Minister of Outreach. Liz, you have been called to serve with us as a teacher. You have been prepared for these ministries by careful instruction in the Word of God so that you carry out your duties in conformity with that Word. As ambassadors of Christ you are to teach the pure doctrine of God's Word, to instruct the young in the way of salvation, and always to have in your heart the spiritual welfare of every soul under your care.

You are to devote yourself to the meditation and study of the Scriptures. You are to be examples to others in godliness and Christian living, putting no stumbling block in anyone's path, so that the ministry will not be discredited.

You are to speak the truth in love, as the apostle Peter reminds us: "Love each other deeply, because love covers over a multitude of sins. If anyone speaks, he should do it as one speaking the very words of God. If anyone serves, he should do it with the strength God provides, so that in all things God may be praised through Jesus Christ. To him be the glory and the power for ever and ever."

"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom, and as you sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs with gratitude in your heart to God. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him."

The ability to carry out this calling is not in us, but comes alone from God, as St. Paul reminded the Corinthian Christians: "Not that we are competent in ourselves to claim anything for ourselves, but our competence comes from God."

The Holy Spirit, who himself has called you to this ministry, will be with you.

Promises by our New Called Workers

M: In keeping with the word and will of the Lord, you are about to be installed into your callings at St. John Lutheran Church and School. I ask you, in the presence of God and this congregation:

Are you fully determined to carry out his work according to the grace which God will give?

- R: I will, and I ask God to help me.
- M: Almighty God, who has given you the will to do these things, graciously give you the strength and compassion to perform them.

Exhortation to the Congregation

M: Brothers and sisters in Christ, you have heard the solemn promise given by the servants you have called. I urge you, therefore, to receive them with joy and to keep in mind always what the Word of God expects of you as members of this congregation:

Work together with them for our Lord's kingdom so that by your works of service and sharing the Good News of Jesus the Body of Christ might be built up.

Help them by your word and example in teaching the young, remembering how the Scriptures urge you to bring up your children in the training and instruction of the Lord.

Pray for them continually, that their ministry among you may be greatly blessed and that they may have a cheerful spirit in all their duties.

Provide also for their physical needs, for the Lord says, "The worker deserves his wages."

Honor and love them, as the apostle Peter urges, "Live in harmony with one another; be sympathetic, love as brothers, be compassionate and humble."


