# Sermon followed by Service

August 25, 2024

Daniel 9

Have you been listening to the news, to the speeches? Coming out of the DNC in Chicago this past week, coming out of Florida or wherever - it doesn't matter. Listen to our would-be leaders; then listen to Daniel - they sound so different, don't they? And not just as leaders. Listen to our world today; then listen to Daniel. By the thinking of our world, Daniel sounds so different; Daniel sounds so wrong. Do you think there might be a lesson there for us.

Our lesson today is just days, weeks, months, after Daniel had been delivered out of the lion's den. Daniel is part of two very different worlds. On the one hand, he has the ear and the respect of the King. On the other hand, he's part of a people who have been stepped on, pushed around, and victimized. According to today's thinking, what should Daniel be doing? Protesting, politicking, getting in someone's face. Instead, what is Daniel doing? He's praying.

What is the lesson there for us?

And his prayer, what do you notice about Daniel's prayer? It sounds so different; it sounds so wrong. What do we know about Daniel? He's known for his piety, his godliness, for being right and doing right. But what does he pray? He prays for forgiveness. That is so different, isn't it? He should be pointing fingers and blaming someone. He should be blaming the people

before him; if not blaming his parents and grandparents, he should be blaming the messed up and ungodly culture that ruined things for Judah and Jerusalem, or better yet, blaming the Babylonians. But why stop there? Instead of confessing to God and asking God for forgiveness, Daniel should be excusing himself before God, seeking justice for himself. More than that, instead of confessing and asking God for forgiveness, Daniel should be blaming God, protesting God, raising his fist against God, turning his back on God. Instead Daniel is asking God for forgiveness.

In times of trouble, are we more likely to confess like Daniel or protest like the world?

And it gets worse. Daniel isn't just praying for himself, apologizing for himself, confessing for himself. Daniel is praying, apologizing, confessing on behalf of his people - a people from Jerusalem who have been torn from their homes, a people whose homes back in Judah are in ruins. (I picture the cities of Judah and Jerusalem back then looking like what we see in Gaza today - ruins.) By today's thinking, it sounds so wrong. Daniel is praying on behalf of his people, a people who have been attacked and assaulted, bullied and beaten, corralled and crushed. And what does Daniel pray? "Forgive us." Not just "Make life right for us," but "forgive us." By today's thinking, Daniel is all wrong. By today's thinking, Daniel shouldn't be praying for forgiveness; Daniel should be demanding justice. By today's thinking, Daniel shouldn't be asking God for forgiveness (in a sense, blaming the victim), Daniel should be blaming God

for letting his people suffer so much. By today's thinking, Daniel sounds so different, Daniel sounds so wrong.

Which prayer comes more easily - "help me" or "forgive me"?

What was Daniel thinking? Something was missing in his life; something was missing in the lives of his people. Daniel had been reading his Bible, reading the scrolls of Jeremiah. There he read something that raised his hopes, and something that troubled his spirit. In Jeremiah, Daniel read God's promise that after 70 years of Babylonian rule, God would deliver his people and set them free to return back home to Jerusalem. It was now nearly 70 years since he along with Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, and thousands more had been taken captive to Babylon. The 70 years were almost up. But Daniel noticed that something was still missing, missing in his life, missing in the lives of his people.

When you read Jeremiah and God's "70-year" promise [Jeremiah 25:9-13; 29:10], that he would deliver his people in 70 years, you can't miss God telling his people why he was handing them over into captivity in the first place, and why their homes and Jerusalem would be destroyed. God had been warning his people - they had been setting their hearts and minds on living the life of the world, and if living the life of the world is what they wanted, then he would hand them over to the world. But God's people wouldn't listen. They chose the life of the world over life with God; they chose the sin of the world over godliness with

God. And so, God did what he said he would do - he handed his people over to the world.

Now, with the 70 years almost over, what did Daniel see? God's people still didn't get it! Sure, some of God's people, like Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, lived the God-life, but more didn't. Some were eager to return to Jerusalem, to rebuild Jerusalem and the Temple as God's home, to live the God-life, but more were settled, comfortable and content to live the Babylonian life. As for why they were in Babylon - some were bitter and angry at the Babylonians, in other words, blaming the world for their troubles; some were bitter and angry at God, blaming God for their troubles; but almost nobody got the connection between their sin and God's judgment [Ezekiel 18]. Here it was, almost 70 years after God announced his judgment, 70 years after God handed his people over to judgment, and for the most part, they still didn't get why.

Do we get why? When we flirt with the life of the world, do we get why God lets the world betray us? When we fall in love with the world, do we get why God might turn the world against us? When we chase the life of the world, do we get why God lets us trip and fall, or maybe even knocks us down? When we think we can do better than God, or better without God, do we get why God lets us fail and fall? Or do we settle for making excuses and blaming others? When our finances go bust, it's so easy to blame the economy. When our health goes bad, it's so easy to blame bad genes - people with the Raddatz gene die. When life goes bad, it is so easy to be content to look for a reason out there, instead of doing the hard thing, the painful thing, of

looking in here (our head and our heart). I'm not saying that every trouble we have has some direct cause in some sin we have committed. The lives of Job and Jesus show that's not true. But it is good, godly wisdom to recognize that God uses trouble to judge sin, and that God uses trouble as a teaching tool to turn us from sin. And that sin may be as simple as being too much in love with our self, instead of setting our heart and mind to fear, love, and trust in God above all things. When trouble hits, we don't need to obsess: "What did I do wrong now?" But it can be good to check what's going on in here [our head and heart] instead of just driving down the road with the check engine light flashing in front of our face.

When trouble hits, and we want to know "why?!" - what is a healthy, godly response?

Daniel knew what to do. He looked in here [Bible]; he looked in the mirror; he looked to God; and he prayed. He didn't just pray for relief, to be delivered, for life to be made right - that would be easy. No, Daniel went to the root, to the core, and in sackcloth and ashes, he begged God to forgive him.

And what did God do? God sent the angel Gabriel to Daniel: "God has heard your prayer, and here's your answer." We'll look at God's answer more in Bible Class. [Gabriel's answer has some of the most difficult verses in the Bible.] Here I'll give you the short and sweet version. In Daniel 2, we heard the Rock that will crush and replace all earthly powers is coming. In Daniel 7, we heard the Son of Man who will rule on God's

throne ... he's coming and he will raise God's people up to rule with him forever in heaven. Now, in Daniel 9, we hear Christ the King is coming. Not only will he crush and replace every evil power out there. Not only will he set up a new kingdom for God's people up there [heaven]. But he will do what we need so we aren't crushed and replaced and thrown into the fire. Gabriel tells Daniel that God has it on his calendar to put an end to our rebellion against God; he will put a stop to sin, a stop to our ungodly failures and faults; he will atone for our wickedness. But that's not all. Gabriel told Daniel that God has it on his calendar to usher in a new right life for us, to wrap up all his promises for us, to anoint a Messiah, a Christ for us. We know how he did that. On the cross, Jesus took Daniel's sin, and Jerusalem's sin, and your sin, and my sin - and he covered it with his blood. As Gabriel told Daniel, with Jesus, your sin and God's judgment, your sin and God's anger - are done - you are forgiven. But that's not all. God has for you a new life, a right life for you. He has all his promises wrapped up for you. And all that is true for you in Christ Jesus.

I know - we don't see all that right now. We don't feel all that right now. But God had it on his calendar to make it true in Jesus - which he did. And now God has it on his calendar to make it true for you - with Daniel and Jesus in heaven. Amen.

God has it on his calendar to deliver us to life made right. How do we put that on our calendar?



FIRST READING Daniel 9:1–19

In the first year of Darius son of Xerxes (a Mede by descent), who was made ruler over the Babylonian kingdom— in the first year of his reign, I, Daniel, understood from the Scriptures, according to the word of the LORD given to Jeremiah the prophet, that the desolation of Jerusalem would last seventy years. So I turned to the Lord God and pleaded with him in prayer and petition, in fasting, and in sackcloth and ashes.

I prayed to the LORD my God and confessed:

"Lord, the great and awesome God, who keeps his covenant of love with those who love him and keep his commandments, we have sinned and done wrong. We have been wicked and have rebelled; we have turned away from your commands and laws. We have not listened to your servants the prophets, who spoke in your name to our kings, our princes and our ancestors, and to all the people of the land.


"Lord, you are righteous, but this day we are covered with shame—the people of Judah and the inhabitants of Jerusalem and all Israel, both near and far, in all the countries where you have scattered us because of our unfaithfulness to you. We and our kings, our princes and our ancestors are covered with shame, LORD, because we have sinned against you. The Lord our God is merciful and forgiving, even though we have rebelled against him; we have not obeyed the LORD our God or kept the laws he gave us through his servants the prophets. All Israel has transgressed your law and turned away, refusing to obey you.

"Therefore the curses and sworn judgments written in the Law of Moses, the servant of God, have been poured out on us, because we have sinned against you. You have fulfilled the words spoken against us and against our rulers by bringing on us great disaster. Under the whole heaven nothing has ever been done like what has been done to Jerusalem. Just as it is written in the Law of Moses, all this disaster has come on us, yet we have not sought the favor of the LORD our God by turning from our sins and giving attention to your truth. The LORD did not hesitate to bring the disaster on us, for the LORD our God is righteous in everything he does; yet we have not obeyed him.

"Now, Lord our God, who brought your people out of Egypt with a mighty hand and who made for yourself a name that endures to this day, we have sinned, we have done wrong. Lord, in keeping with all your righteous acts, turn away your anger and your wrath from Jerusalem, your city, your holy hill. Our sins and the iniquities of our ancestors have made Jerusalem and your people an object of scorn to all those around us.

"Now, our God, hear the prayers and petitions of your servant. For your sake, Lord, look with favor on your desolate sanctuary. Give ear, our God, and hear; open your eyes and see the desolation of the city that bears your Name. We do not make requests of you because we are righteous, but because of your great mercy. Lord, listen! Lord, forgive! Lord, hear and act! For your sake, my God, do not delay, because your city and your people bear your Name."
