Jesus was a bloody mess. And there was no one there to stop the bleeding. No one to protest the cruel and inhumane punishment. No one seeking a stay to the execution. Jesus had some people there, but none of them were in a position to stop the bleeding. The church was there but they weren't calling for mercy; they were calling for Jesus' blood to be spilled. The Law was there, but they weren't interested in stopping the bleeding; some were cold to the bleeding; some were hot to work the bleeding. And God was there, until he wasn't there; but he didn't look to stop the bleeding either. In fact, what did we hear from Isaiah? "It was the LORD's will to cause him to suffer."

And so Jesus was a bloody mess. The Gospel writers don't go into much detail. Psalm 22 goes more into the gore. Some preachers, some writers, some movies and artists go into the bloody, gory, awful details, but not the Gospel writers. They keep it simple - Jesus was beaten and scourged, he was nailed to a cross, crucified. Then when the time was right, Jesus gave up his spirit. And the soldiers to make sure he was dead, they pieced his side, and blood and water flowed out. Jesus was a bloody mess.

Why? If the Gospel writers weren't going to go more into the gore, the details of how Jesus died, we might expect them to go more into the details of why Jesus died. But they don't. Instead John and the others do what Jesus did; they point back to what was written in the Old Testament. As Jesus dies, John shows the connection between Jesus and the Passover Lamb ("Not one of his bones will be broken."). You might remember, John had made the Jesus-Lamb connection earlier; back in chapter 1, John the Gospel writer records John the Baptizer: "Look, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world." How? Not as lawyer getting us off, not as legal reformer changing the law to get us off, not as an activist or advocate changing the judge's heart to get us off, but as substitute Jesus took our place as guilty, and as sacrifice Jesus paid the price of our sin. Listen to Isaiah: "But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed. We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to his own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all. He was oppressed and afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; he was led like a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before her shearers is silent,

so he did not open his mouth." Why? We heard it before: "It was the LORD's will to crush him and cause him to suffer, [to make] his life a guilt offering." As John the Baptist said; "to take away the sin of the world."

Did it work? Does it work? Does it work better than our blaming and excusing? Does it work better than our lying and denying? Sometimes we might wonder: "If Jesus died to pay for my sin, then why inside me do I still feel so guilty? If Jesus died to pay for my sin, then why all around me is God working so much trouble against me? Why is God so busy making me pay? Did Jesus miss a step? Did Jesus drop the ball? Did Jesus fall short? Why do I feel, why does my life look like I still have to pay?"

Why do I feel? That's a great question, isn't it? Why do I still feel hungry after I've eaten a full meal? Why do I feel cold when I'm in church and it's 72 degrees? Why do I feel hot when I'm outside and it's only 60 degrees? My feelings don't determine truth. Sometimes my feelings are running behind the truth. Sometimes my feelings are running wild apart from the truth. Sometimes my feelings tell me I need to pay more attention to the truth. And what is the truth? Jesus tell us: "It is finished."

"Then why does God have so much trouble working against me?" It could be that God is treating me as guilty and godless because I am living as guilty and godless. It could be that I need a taste of God's judgment to keep me from joining the world in its sin. It could be that I need a taste of some trouble to keep me thinking I'm good on my own. It could be that God is giving me a taste of trouble so I can help others in their trouble. It could be we could on and on. But why is God working this or that trouble against me? It's not because Jesus hasn't done what we need.... You have his word - "It is finished."

In our lesson, John is the last of the Gospel writiers to take us to Good Friday. John knows what's been told before. He knows what's been questioned before. And what does John show us? Jesus got it right, Jesus got it done. Again and again, John shows, Jesus knew the plan, Jesus worked the plan, and Jesus fulfilled the plan - it is finished! And how do we know? That, my friends, is what Easter is about!

We ask our fellow Christians from other denominations to kindly respect our practice and refrain from the Lord's Supper at this time. If you have questions, please speak with the pastor.

We Care about Your Children

We love to have children with us for worship. Children's worship bulletins and "church bags" (with paper, colors, and Bible story books) are available from an usher. Baby noises can be beautiful to our Savior who said, "Let the little children come to me." If children are crying loudly, our nursery and Gathering Area (back of the church) are audio-equipped and available for you and your young children. After the children regain their composure, come back so we can all worship together.

Our Facilities

Restrooms are in our Fellowship Hall, downstairs and to the right of the kitchen.



Our service this evening is a Tenebrae service, a service of shadows and darkness, reminding us of the darkness of our sin and guilt, the darkness of the world's hate and anger against God, and, yes, the darkness of God's curse on our sin, charged against Jesus.

In a Tenebrae service, candles are extinguished and lights are dimmed to impress on us the utter darkness and loneliness, the horrible curse that Jesus faced on the cross. As you hear of Jesus' burial and the service closes, expect to hear the *strepitus*. (In various Tenebrae traditions, the sharp, loud noise of the *strepitus* stands for the earth shaking and rocks breaking at Jesus' death, the stone rolled in front of Jesus' tomb, or the rending of Christ's tomb on Easter morning.) As the seventh candle is removed we are reminded of Jesus' death; as it returns we are reminded that he lives with the Father. As the service draws to a close, see the sign of hope - in the darkness, a light still burns - Easter is coming!

After the service, the congregation may remain for prayer and meditation before leaving quietly. If you wish to speak to the pastor, please go to his office (door near the piano).







M: Finally, let us pray for all those things for which our Lord would have us ask in the words he himself has taught us.


THE LORD'S PRAYER
