Sermon followed by Service

March 28, 2024 - Maundy Holy Thursday 2024

Outside the walls of an upper room in Jerusalem, the enemies of Jesus are getting ready. For a long time they've wanted Jesus dead. Now, after Palm Sunday, with crowds cheering Jesus, with crowds wanting to see and hear more of Jesus, Jesus' enemies are scheming all the more urgently to get rid of him. But the crowds were always in their way. Until now. Now they have Judas on their payroll; now they have Judas offering a way. So somewhere out there, they lurk and conspire.

Soon it will all come to a head, not just their plot against Jesus, but God's plan for Jesus. The next 24 hours will be a whirlwind - the mob arresting Jesus in the Garden; Jesus put on trial before Annas and Caiphas, and Pilate and Herod; Jesus crucified on the cross.

But not yet. Not here. For a few hours in this second-floor room, it's just Jesus and his disciples. How he has longed for this moment! This time with his disciples is precious to him. Throughout his ministry, he's looked for time to be alone with them. Later tonight, when Jesus is praying in the Garden, he'll bring three of his disciples along and insist that they watch and pray with him - and he's disappointed when they don't. Outside this upper room, his enemies lie in wait, but inside it's Jesus with his disciples.

Now Jesus and his disciples aren't just hanging out. They've gathered to celebrate the Passover. Some 14-15 hundred years earlier, God had delivered his people out of slavery in Egypt. Egypt wasn't letting go easily; even after nine plagues, Egypt was still holding out against God. So God would break their spirit - he would strike down all the firstborn in the land. But he offered a way out. He commanded his people to celebrate a special meal: at twilight to slaughter for supper a young lamb without defect; to paint its blood on the doorframes of their houses; to roast it and eat it and wait for the Lord to do his thing. That night, when the LORD came to judge, when the LORD came to deliver, the LORD passed over the houses marked with the blood of the lamb. And the LORD delivered, just as he had promised.

Now it was time to remember that promise. God had put it on his people's calendar - every year they were to celebrate the Passover meal, not just to remember what God had done to deliver his people in the past, but to look ahead to what God would do to deliver his people in the future. The Passover lamb was God's picture of the perfect Lamb of God who would be sacrificed for the sins of the world - his blood would protect them from God's wrath, his life and death would set them free from their slavery to sin and death. Now it was time to remember that promise, and Jesus, as the true Passover Lamb of God, was eager to share it with his disciples. More than that, Jesus was eager to share himself with his disciples.

What Jesus does that night with the Passover isn't just a new twist on an old tradition. Jesus is giving us something new and better. For the first time, Jesus bequeaths to his people his real body and blood, his very self that he will give in death the next day. On this night, he gives a down payment on the new covenant, the new pact and promise God was enacting - "I will be your God and you will be my people. ... I will forgive your sins and remember your transgressions no longer."

What a wonderful promise for his disciples! Not just in words, but by giving himself he promises them - in all the trouble that was coming their way - "I will be your God and you will be my people." For all the ways they would crack under the pressure and fail their Lord and Savior - "I will forgive your sins and remember your transgressions no longer." What a wonderful promise for us! Not just in words, but by giving himself Jesus promises us - in all the trouble that comes our way - "I will be your God and you will be my people." For all the ways we crack and fail our Lord and Savior - "I will forgive your sins and remember your transgressions no longer." And just as Jesus was eager to share that promise with his disciples, Jesus is eager to share that promise with us.

And that eagerness goes both ways, doesn't it? Just as Jesus is eager to share his promise with us, we're eager to have Jesus share his promise with us, aren't we?

Right now, enemies - enemies of Christ and his Church - are out there, trouble is out there, looking to stop Jesus, looking to separate Jesus from his church, working to separate us from Jesus. The people of this world rise up

to put God and his people on trial. They stand in judgment over God's good gifts. They ridicule the words God has given us and they conspire to prevent God's words from influencing us or them, our culture or our children. They judge us to be out of touch and are happy to exclude us, or to include us in their sin. Moved my Satan, all around us evil forces lurk and conspire.

Which is why it's so good for us to be here, in this room, in God's house with God's people, with Jesus.

Not that we don't bring sin in here with us. Our church doors don't have some sort of spiritual power that keeps sin out. Where there are sinners, there is sin. On that first Maundy Holy Thursday, sin was in that upper room, not just in Judas, but in all the twelve. And today, we are no different. We bring our sin, our guilt, our doubts and fears.

Which is why we need to be here all the more! Jesus is eager to gather us together here, to assure us that his blood covers our sins and shields us from God's judgment. He reminds us - "He will be our God" - we have him exercising his rule and power and control over everything and everyone for us. He reminds us - "we will be his people" - he has us safe in his heart and safe in his hands.

He reminds us, not just with words, but with himself. He doesn't just speak to us across a table; he invites us to the table, his table. He invites: "Come with me away from the world. I'm here for you - my body for you, my blood for you. To give you peace - I'm here for you. To make your strong - I'm here for you. Better than the world - I'm here for you." He invites: "Come with me away from the world, just you and me."

Not just individually, but together. Here we enjoy communion together with Jesus and communion together with each other. As Jesus gathers us together, he gathers us to believe together as one. As Jesus gathers us together, he gathers us as brothers and sisters with the same needs and the same promise. Together we need and we receive the same peace and forgiveness. Together we need and we receive the same strength. Together we need and we receive the same hope and promise. For Jesus, it never gets old. He's eager to gather us; he's eager to be with us. And he's eager to see us eager to be with him, eager to be with each other.

If this life is like a courtroom where the world puts God and his people on trial, think of this Supper as a recess in the trial - a place free from accusations, a place free from hostile witnesses, a place free from judgments. A place of peace with God and peace with each other. Yes, a place a bit like heaven. Amen.

OLD TESTAMENT READING

Exodus 12:21-30

Then Moses summoned all the elders of Israel and said to them, "Go at once and select the animals for your families and slaughter the Passover lamb. Take a bunch of hyssop, dip it into the blood in the basin and put some of the blood on the top and on both sides of the doorframe. None of you shall go out of the door of your house until morning. When the LORD goes through the land to strike down the Egyptians, he will see the blood on the top and sides of the doorframe and will pass over that doorway, and he will not permit the destroyer to enter your houses and strike you down.

"Obey these instructions as a lasting ordinance for you and your descendants. When you enter the land that the LORD will give you as he promised, observe this ceremony. And when your children ask you, 'What does this ceremony mean to you?' then tell them, 'It is the Passover sacrifice to the LORD, who passed over the houses of the Israelites in Egypt and spared our homes when he struck down the Egyptians.' " Then the people bowed down and worshiped. The Israelites did just what the LORD commanded Moses and Aaron.

At midnight the LORD struck down all the firstborn in Egypt, from the firstborn of Pharaoh, who sat on the throne, to the firstborn of the prisoner, who was in the dungeon, and the firstborn of all the livestock as well. Pharaoh and all his officials and all the Egyptians got up during the night, and there was loud wailing in Egypt, for there was not a house without someone dead.

Then came the day of Unleavened Bread on which the Passover lamb had to be sacrificed. Jesus sent Peter and John, saying, "Go and make preparations for us to eat the Passover."

"Where do you want us to prepare for it?" they asked.

He replied, "As you enter the city, a man carrying a jar of water will meet you. Follow him to the house that he enters, and say to the owner of the house, 'The Teacher asks: Where is the guest room, where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?' He will show you a large room upstairs, all furnished. Make preparations there."

They left and found things just as Jesus had told them. So they prepared the Passover.

When the hour came, Jesus and his apostles reclined at the table. And he said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer. For I tell you, I will not eat it again until it finds fulfillment in the kingdom of God."

After taking the cup, he gave thanks and said, "Take this and divide it among you. For I tell you I will not drink again from the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes."

And he took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me."

In the same way, after the supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you."

INSTRUCTION FOR THE END OF LENT

M: In this Lenten season we have heard again how our Lord walked the path of suffering which led him to the cross for our salvation. We have also heard our Lord's call to intensify our struggle against sin, death, and the devil—all that keeps us from loving God and each other. This is the struggle to which we were committed at Baptism; God's forgiveness and the power of his Spirit to amend our lives continue with us because of his love for us in Jesus, our Savior.

Within the family of the Church, God never wearies of giving peace and new life. In the absolution we receive forgiveness as from God himself. This absolution we should not doubt, but firmly believe that our sins are thus forgiven before God in heaven, for it comes to us in the name and by the command of our Lord.

We who receive God's love in Jesus Christ are called to love one another, to be servants to each other, as Jesus became our servant.

In Holy Communion the members of Christ's body participate most intimately in his love. Remembering our Lord's last supper with his disciples, we eat the bread and drink the cup of this meal. Together we receive the Lord's gift of his body and blood for forgiveness and participate in that new covenant that makes us one with him and one another. The Lord's Supper is the promise of the great banquet we will share with all the faithful when our Lord returns, the joyous culmination of our reconciliation with God and each other.

CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION

M: Let us confess our sins to God and ask for his forgiveness.

C: Almighty God, merciful Father,

I confess to you that I have not loved you with all my heart.

In what I have done and left undone,

I have pursued my ways instead of your ways.

For this I deserve your punishment both now and in eternity.

I am truly sorry for my sins.

I repent of them.

I beg for your mercy, O Lord.

Silence for meditation.

- M: Forgive us for the sake of Jesus Christ who suffered and died for us.
- C: Cleanse me from my sins.

Release me from my guilt.

Grant me your Holy Spirit to amend my sinful life.

- M: The almighty God has been merciful to us and has sent his Son to die for all. For his sake, God forgives our sins and calls us from darkness to his marvelous light. Therefore, as a called servant of Christ and by his authority, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.
- C: Amen.

EXHORTATION

M: Our Lord Jesus Christ has forgiven us and reconciled us to God and has promised us the power to forgive and love each other. Relying on his promise, therefore, be reconciled with one another.

All: Brothers and sisters, may the peace of Christ rule in our hearts, in our words, and in our actions.

PRAYER OF THE DAY

M: Let us pray. Lord Jesus Christ, in the Sacrament of Holy Communion you give us your true body and blood as a remembrance of your suffering and death on the cross. Grant us so firmly to believe your words and promise that we may always partake of this Sacrament to our eternal good; for you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

C: Amen.

The Sacrament of Holy Communion

From Martin Luther's Small Catechism

As the head of the family should teach them in the simplest way to those in his household.

The Institution of Holy Communion

First: What is the sacrament of Holy Communion?

It is the true body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ under the bread and wine, instituted by Christ for us Christians to eat and to drink.

Where is this written?

The holy Evangelists Matthew, Mark, Luke, and the Apostle Paul tell us: Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night he was betrayed, took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat; this is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Then he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me."

The Blessings of Holy Communion

Second: What blessing do we receive through this eating and drinking? That is shown us by these words, "Given and poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins." Through these words we receive forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation in this sacrament. For where there is forgiveness of sins, there is also life and salvation.

The Power of Holy Communion

Third: How can eating and drinking do such great things?

It is certainly not the eating and drinking that does such things, but the words, "Given and poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins." These words are the main thing in this sacrament, along with the eating and drinking. And whoever believes these words has what they plainly say, the forgiveness of sins.

The Reception of Holy Communion

Fourth: Who, then, is properly prepared to receive this sacrament? Fasting and other outward preparations may serve a good purpose, but he is properly prepared who believes these words, "Given and poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins." But whoever does not believe these words or doubts them is not prepared, because the words "for you" require nothing but hearts that believe.
