Sermon followed by Service

June 30, 2024

Matthew 14:22-33

Row, row, row your boat, Gently down the stream. Merrily, merrily, merrily, merrily, Life is but a dream.

But life isn't always a dream and the stream isn't always gentle. What about when life is a nightmare and you're stuck out in the storm? That's where the disciples were - stuck in a storm, getting blasted and bounced, wishing it were just a nightmare. So what can we learn from the disciples ... what can we learn from Jesus for those times we're STUCK IN A STORM?

Let's look at our lesson: **Immediately Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead of him to the other side, while he dismissed the crowd.** After he had dismissed them, he went up on a mountainside by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but the boat was already a considerable distance from land, buffeted by the waves because the wind was against it.

The first thing we might wonder is: "What were the disciples doing in a boat on the Sea of Galilee, not just in the middle of the night, but all night long?" For as many as 6, 8, 12 hours the disciples had been trying to get back home ... and now in the last part of the night, before sunrise, they were rowing, rowing, rowing with all their might against the wind, and getting

nowhere. We might imagine the disciples had the same question: "What are we doing out here? Where's Jesus? Whose bright idea was it that got us stuck out here blasted by the wind, bounced by the waves, going nowhere?"

Whose bright idea was it? Jesus'. Jesus made the disciples get in the boat and head out across the water. It seems the disciples weren't too fired up on the idea. Maybe they didn't like the look of the sky or the water ... maybe they didn't like the idea of leaving Jesus behind. But Jesus made them get into the boat and head back across the sea. That's right. The disciples were stuck in the wind, bounced by the waves, because Jesus wanted them there.

Why? It seems Jesus didn't want his disciples stuck with the crowd. The crowd of 5000 that Jesus and the disciples had just fed, that crowd wanted to make Jesus their king. That doesn't sound so bad, does it? Jesus came to be our king, right? Add the words "by force" ... the crowds wanted to make Jesus their king by force and we see something wasn't right. The crowds wanted to make Jesus their bread king, their miracle king, their easy-button king - the king who would make life easy for them. They didn't want Jesus to be their king so they could follow him and serve him in everlasting righteousness, innocense, and blessedness. No, they wanted Jesus to be their king so that he could follow them and serve them with food and miracles and whatever else they wanted. They weren't on the "Take my life and let it be, consecrated, Lord, to thee" plan. They were on the "it's all about me" plan. Jesus knew just how much that plan appealed to the disciples. He knew how they wanted power and prestige. So "immediately" after the feeding of the 5000, before and because they could get sucked up into the crowd, "Jesus made his disciples get into the boat and go on ahead of him." And now they're stuck in the storm getting blasted and bounced by wind and wave.

What does that mean for us? There could be times we feel stuck in a storm, blasted and bounced, or stuck going nowhere why? ... because we listen to Jesus. At times doing things Jesus' way - with love and patience - seems to get us nowhere. At times doing things Jesus' way - perhaps in dating and marriage doesn't get us what we want. At times doing things Jesus' way maybe at work - just seems to get us into trouble. At those times that listening to Jesus makes for hard rowing and a hard life, here's something for us to think about -

- Jesus is at work to save us we might not know what he's saving us from, but we can know that Jesus is at work to save us, just as he was looking out for his disciples ...
- perhaps like the disciples Jesus has us rowing hard, making our life hard, to keep us out of some trouble we don't know about;
- perhaps like the disciples Jesus has us stuck because he knows how success goes to our heads;
- perhaps like the disciples Jesus has us not getting what we want, because he knows we're better off not getting what we want, when we want;

- perhaps - like the disciples - Jesus is setting us up for something better.

When doing things Jesus' way has us feeling stuck and going nowhere ... when doing things Jesus' way seems to mean hard rowing, when it seems that Jesus' way just makes life harder instead of thinking that Jesus' way must be wrong, we get to see Jesus looking out for the good of his people.

That's what we see in our lesson. It's still night, dark and blowing. The disciples are struggling and getting nowhere. Jesus sees how the disciples are struggling. So what does Jesus do? He doesn't stop the winds and calm the waters. That's not what the disciples needed. He was what the disciples needed. So Jesus goes out to the disciples' boat, walking on the water. Seeing Jesus walk on the water the disciples cry out in fear, in terror: "it's a ghost." So how does Jesus answer their fear and terror? Not with a miracle to calm the wind and the waves; but with his word he calms his disciples: "**Take courage! It is I! Don't be afraid**."

With that word, the wind doesn't stop; the waves don't calm; but his disciples' hearts are made strong. Peter wants to join Jesus: "Lord, if it's you, tell me to come out to you on the water." And at Jesus' invitation Peter does just that. He gets out of the boat and walks on the water toward Jesus, until he gets distracted. Peter takes his eyes off Jesus; he gets distracted by the wind and the waves: "What am I doing? I can't …" And Peter begins to sink. "Lord, save me."

Do we remember that call for help? When the wind and the waves have us sinking ... when guilt and accusations are crushing ... when fear and worry - over our bills and broken bodies and our broken jobs and broken homes - when fear and worry give us that sinking feeling ... do we remember that call for help? "Lord, save me! God, have mercy on me a sinner! Jesus, I need you!"

In our lesson we see Jesus reach out his hand and save Peter. At the cross we see Jesus stretch out both hands around our sin and guilt; he takes it; he makes it his own; he pays for it he's dead; your sin is gone. But on Easter, Jesus is alive and reaching out his hands again - "Peace. It might not seem possible, but I'm really here for you." Every day we get to hear Jesus call to us: **"Take courage; I'm here for you; don't be afraid.**" And some day, we will get to hear Jesus: "I'm here to take you home, home to heaven."

When life isn't just a gentle float down the stream and it seems more nightmare than dream ... when you seem stuck in the storm and sinking ... remember Jesus walking on the water to save his disciples. Hear the promise of Jesus: "**Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid**!" Even if you don't see him walking on water, Jesus has come to save you, too. Amen.




